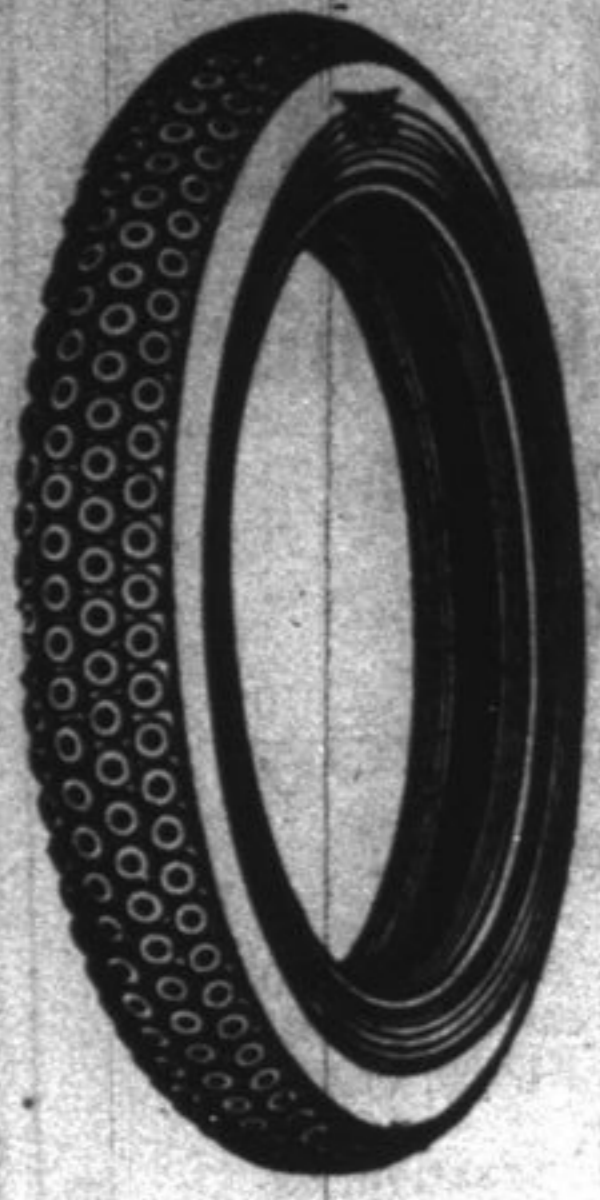

PUBLIC LIBRARY

Highland Park Camp Library week
was a huge success. Our specified
amount was three hundred dollars
and at the end of the week our books
showed the receipt of \$295.50 from
116 persons, with the additional ap-
propriation of \$50 from the local
library making the total \$345.50. A
check for \$300 has already been sent
to headquarters. From the balance
the expenses of the campaign are to
be met—consequently, in order to
make our contribution as large as
possible, no personal acknowledg-
ments of gifts have been sent. When
the accounts are closed we expect
to be able to send at least thirty or
thirty-five dollars more to be added
to the original amount.

People have not only given funds
but many have also contributed
magazines and books. To date the
total number of books for men in
service is 175 classified roughly as
follows:

- Fiction—118.
- Poetry, drama and literature—31.
- Biography, history and travel—34.
- Technical and scientific—4
- Religious and ethical—8.
- French study—2.
- Miscellaneous—1.

The magazines received numbered
701.

The library board and librarian are
greatly pleased with the results of
the week and ask you to keep con-
tributing magazines and books as
often as possible. Weekly shipments
will be made to headquarters for
books and from there they will be
distributed to the various canton-
ments and camps.
