Official News Notes on all War Work

Under the instruction of Mrs. Henry Bacon, classes in the art of registration, for the benefit of registrars, are now being held on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays at two o'clock at the Presbyterian church, this in preparation for the nation-wide registration of women to be held early in November. All registrars are urged, advised—even cautioned—to attend these classes.

**Red Cross Shop**  
At the Red Cross Shop the knitting is progressing very well. Large quantities of yarn have been given out and large numbers of very excellently knitted garments have, thereafter, marched back into the empty places where the raw materials once were. However the head of the shop suggests that much work other than knittings must needs be done and she warmly urges ladies with a spare morning or afternoon to dispose of to drop in at the shop and put in their time rolling the much discussed bandage or folding the far famed sponge. Or, for those who care neither to roll nor to fold, there remains always the needle to ply. Try ladies on your spare afternoons, one or another of those soothing sports.

**Army and Navy Center**  
If the Highland Parkers who have given such generous gifts to the Army and Navy Center could all read the warm, appreciative notes from men who use the rooms, to the management, they would feel as the committee does that all their services, however elaborate, have been more than sufficiently rewarded. Not long ago a box was fastened to the wall of the Center with a sign above it reading: Please Drop Suggestions for Improvements in These Rooms into this Box. So far the only communication found in the box is a note (signed by a whole company of infantry) which opens thus:

Ladies of the Army and Navy Center: This is not a suggestion as to anything more, but, instead, an expression of deep appreciation of the many conveniences that have already been furnished us, etc.

Other such communications come through the mail or are given to the custodian of the rooms. This week the Center is the delighted recipient of two ukeleles—one from Miss Cornelia Matie and one from Miss Cornelia Matie and one now defies the town to think of a pleasing stringed instrument that is not represented in the Center collection. Also Mrs. Leuer presented the Center with phonograph records and two music books. By the way, the ukeleles were without strings when they came but when a member of the committee dropped into Mr. Samuel Levin's shop to buy some, he provided the strings and refused to be paid for them. It is rapidly becoming practically impossible to buy anything for the Army and Navy Center. Its currency is not honored in the shops.

Mr. Fred Schaefer, plumber and Mr. T. H. Decker, plumber, have both recently donated their services and plumbed for us for the love of it. The committee requests that women relatives of soldiers will not use the Center except in the mornings or on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. This request is made because the Center is intended, primarily, as a men's entertainment room and the men do not feel free to smoke and lounge when ladies are sitting about.

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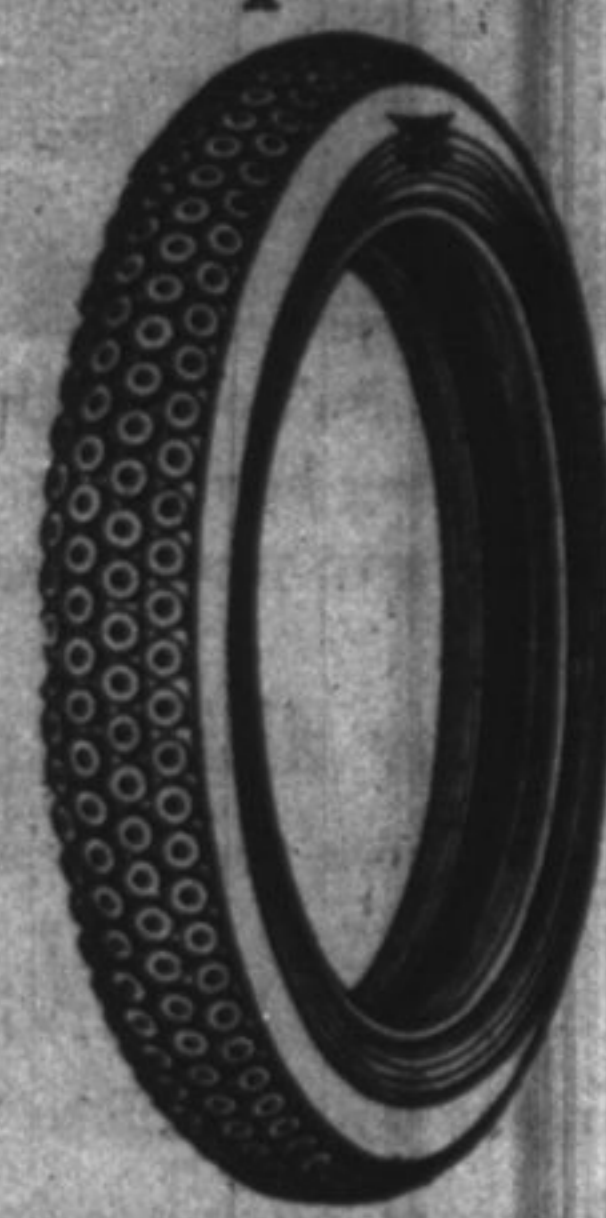
