REGULAR MEETING OF H. P. DEFENSE COUNCIL

TREASURER MAKES REPORT

Complete List of Highland Park Men Drafted into National Army is Posted at C. & N. W. Station

The regular meeting of the Highland Park Defense Council was held Tuesday night in the City Hall. Mr. Ruffner, chairman of the special Liberty Loan Committee, reported that many thousands of circulars and dodgers had been distributed throughout the city. The mailing list of the Gas company was used, and circulars were distributed through the newspaper delivery service. Circulars were also placed in all the churches and public places in the city. The publicity campaign conducted by this committee is deserving of very high praise.

Mr. Vercoe, Treasurer, reported that about \$2500 had been received to date from the recent financial drive. He had no doubt that the balance of the \$5000 fund would be received before January 1 1918.

Mr. James H. Duffy reported for the special coal committee. Satisfactory progress is being made by the committee and the local dealers in the solution of the coal problem. George A. Schofield was made chairman of the committee in place of Burridge D. Butler. Mr. Butler, however, will remain a member of the committee.

The Council referred to its finance committee a request to contribute toward the expense of furnishing uniforms to the high school cadets. A request for a contribution toward the expense of purchasing musical instruments for the cadet band was also referred to the finance committee. In each case the Council indicated to the committee that it approved of the request, leaving to the committee the determination of the amount of the contribution.

Captain Morgan reported progress in making arrangements for the next patriotic meeting, which may be held some time next week.

A complete list of Highland Park men drafted into the national army, and a list of men discharged or released by the exemption board, and a list of men sent to Camp Grant, Rockford, have been posted on the Council Bulletin Board at the Northwestern station. It is difficult to obtain a correct list of the men who are serving in the army, navy and aviation corps and who are not in the army cantonments. The Council desires to revise this list from time to time and requests that any names not appearing on such list will be sent promptly to the Defense Council.

RECKTENWALD SHOP BROKEN INTO, FRIDAY

Burglars Enter Shoe Shop and Escape with Fancy Stock. Local Police Working
