The members are glad to see a number of men in uniform at the different services.

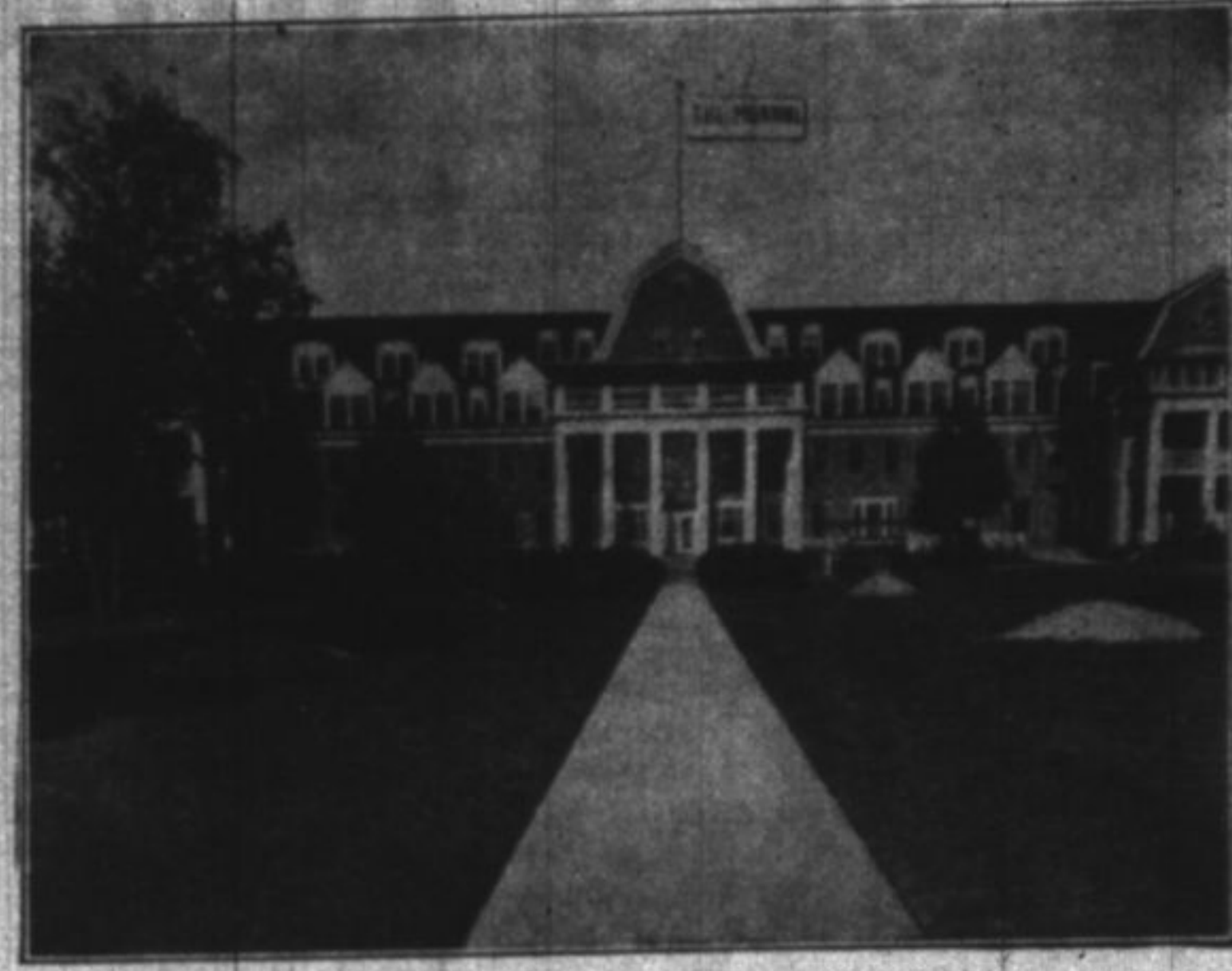
