**WOMEN, SIGN THE HOOVER PLEDGE CARD**

HELP TO FEED THE WORLD  
Food Conservation Cards to be Given out at Registration Booths Next Week. Sign Them

The days from October 29 to November 10, are of particular importance to women of Illinois because that is the time set for the making of the record of the woman power of Illinois for war. The boys have long been under marching order, some of them have already "gone over the top", but the women have not as yet gone on record except here and there in small groups.

There is need, urgent need—to save wheat, meat, fat and sugar; to have on record the women of Illinois. Economy, which means wise expenditure, saving, planning of meals—all these are essentially a woman's job, a housewife's privilege. Many women are making the most of these opportunities, but why not say so openly and publicly. Why not let the boys in camp in the United States and "somewhere in France" know that the women have voluntarily placed themselves under marching orders. Why not let the world know that money is forthcoming; that the supply of wheat, meat, fat and sugar are being wisely used at home that there may be enough to spare for the Allies; that the woman power is being mobilized.

All of this means that the women of Illinois, from Cairo to Chicago are to sign the Hoover Pledge and to register during the days set apart. This is the Hoover pledge:

"To the Food Administrator: I am glad to join you in the service of food conservation for our nation and I hereby accept membership in the United States Food Administration, pledging myself to carry out the direction and advice of the Food Administration in my home, in so far as my circumstances permit."

It is evident that every woman, can, without any compensation, promise that she will do what she can. Some women signed the pledge in July and sent their ten cents to Washington and for one reason or another received no reply. The plan is simpler this time. There is no fee, no charge of any kind. The card comes from the office of the Food Administrator for Illinois, Mr. Harry Wheeler, 129 West Adams Street, Chicago, and goes back to his office. It carries the franking privilege, that is, requires no postage, so that there is absolutely nothing for the woman to do except to sign her name and see that it gets into the postoffice.

When the card reaches Mr. Wheeler's office, you will be presented with a membership card as a recognition of the fact that he has received your pledge and that he can say to Mr. Hoover: "These Illinois women have assured me that they are ready to be of service in this war work."

These food conservation cards will be at the Registration booths next week.
