61 ALIENS GET PAPERS

William Mather Lewis to Issue Book, Great Lakes Barracks Completed, Collect Spawm for Hatching

61 Aliens Get Papers Of the 161 aliens who appeared before Peter Blaiser, naturalization examiner in circuit court at Waukegan last week and took examinations, sixty-one received citizenship papers. This is considered a good record, as good in fact, as has been established there in a long time. Mr. Blaiser was pleased with the knowledge displayed by the majority of those who were seeking to be naturalized.

Wm. Mather Lewis to Issue Book William Mather Lewis of Lake Forest, executive secretary of the national committee of Patriotic and Defense Societies, is soon to issue a new book "The Voices of Our Leaders" which comprises a collection of the vital war documents of the United States and its allies.

Mr. Lewis is widely known as a writer and speaker on educational topics, particularly those connected with patriotism, and the book has the strong advance endorsement of educators and patriots. Addresses on the subject of American participation in the war by President Wilson, Secretary Lane, Arthur Balfour, Rene Viviani, Viscount Ishii, and others with an introduction by Secretary Baker give hint of the contents of the work. Profits from sale of the book are to be devoted to the Soldier's Library Fund and other war relief work, according to an announcement by the author.

Farmers Storm Paper

One hundred farmers, roused by an article in the milk situation in which the terms "L. W. W." and "Kaiser boosters" were used, stormed the office of the Lake County Tribune, Grayslake, at 3 o'clock Monday night.

Violence was averted it is declared by some of those present, only by the presence of Constable Clarence Hicks of Waukegan, who was called to the scene earlier in the evening. It is reported by Chester Arthur Miller, former editor of the paper, who feared he would be horsewhipped or his office wrecked. Five Waukegan aids accompanied Mr. Hicks. While the farmers were brandishing their fists and demanding an explanation of the article, it developed that the newspaper had changed hands and that the new proprietors were William Ellis publisher of the Searchlight, and his son Kenneth M. Ellis.

Lake Forest Review Gives Up The Lake Forest Review a paper which has struggled along bravely for several months, finally has "given up the ghost."

This became known Friday when the weekly edition failed to make its appearance. Dave Linsen, the editor, admitted that with the colors nailed to the masthead his staunch little ship has disappeared beneath the murky waters of the High Cost of Living.

The failure of the Review appears to be proof that Lake Forest will not support two papers and because "The Lake Forester" had been established many years, having unusual prestige for a small town paper, it weathered the storm that existed while the two papers were battling for supremacy.

Collect Spawm for Hatching

Just now game wardens of Illinois attached to the fish hatcheries are collecting the spawm of trout in the lake of Waukegan. They began Friday and about 30 quarts of spawm was collected. They will probably stay there about ten days, collecting on the average about 30 quarts a day.

This spawm as taken from the fish is carefully placed in jars and transported over to the fish hatchery at Spring Grove, near Antioch. There it is placed in careful keeping of attendants and about February the fish begin to hatch.

Great Lakes Barracks Completed The new \$10,000,000 barracks at Great Lakes were all inhabited Sunday by the "jackies". All tents having disappeared.

As well as being well sheltered in the new buildings, food figures seem

to indicate that the boys are not lacking for nourishment.

Here are the daily figures: Seven thousand pounds of roast beef; 2,000 pounds of mashed potatoes, 500 quarts of gravy, 15,000 radishes, 4,000 tomatoes, 100 pounds of green peas, 3,000 pounds of cake, 7,000 pounds of milk, 6,000 loaves of bread and 5,000 quarts of coffee.

USE MORE FISH IN WAR COOKERY

Fish food is good food, and takes nothing out of the bread wheat. Among the many varieties without regard to groups or cheapness are trout, white fish, perch, herring, cat, halibut, salmon, cod, bass, mackerel and shad.

We are told that the American housewives do not understand or appreciate the value of fish in the diet. Let us use more and save the ounce of meat per person per day to send the Allies, the meat they must have. Some left over fish recipes follow:

Scalloped Salmon and Macaroni Layers of salmon, cooked macaroni and medium cream sauce. Bake 25 minutes and serve hot in baking dish.

Fish Loaf 2 cups cold flaked fish, 2 eggs, 1 cup bread crumbs, seasoning of salt, pepper and onion juice. Add crumbs to fish, stir in eggs, slightly, and season. Steam in mould 30 minutes. Casserole of fish, rice and seasonings of salt, pepper, onion juice, 1 egg and milk to moisten. Cook 45 minutes.
