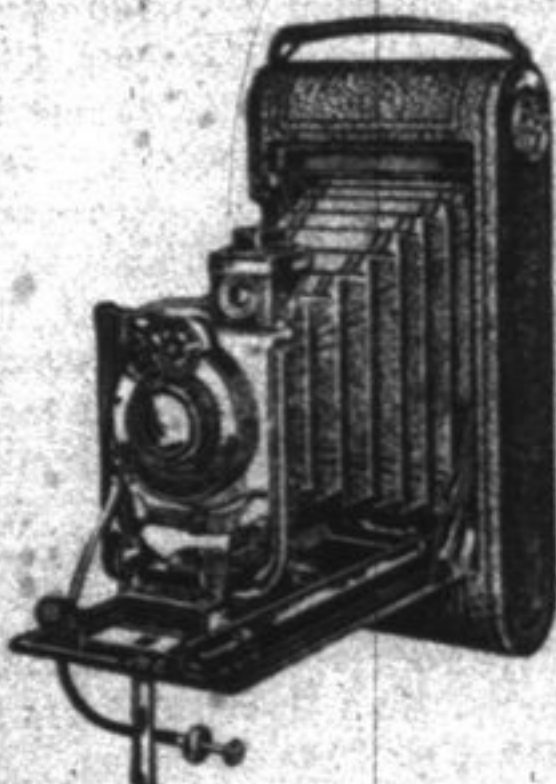

### PARENTS AND TEACHERS

The Deerfield Shields High School Parent Teacher Association met in the English Club room Monday afternoon. Mrs. Quayle, the president presiding. A patriotic committee of thirty members was appointed to act as godmothers to the cadet corps.

Mrs. Spedel of Lake Forest and Mrs. Norcross of Highland Park were requested to secure the names and photographs of former members of the high school now in the service of the United States.

Mrs. Reichelt, Jr. was appointed press correspondent. Mrs. Silver, chairman of the educational committee had charge of the program, the subject of which was "Preparation for college".

From the four angles of the major studies Dr. Newhall, Miss Grandy, Mr. Taylor and Mr. Sandwick told of the requirements of preparation for college entrance examinations.

The leading women's colleges in the east are now making a more careful selection of pupils, and have refused certificate privileges throughout the country.
