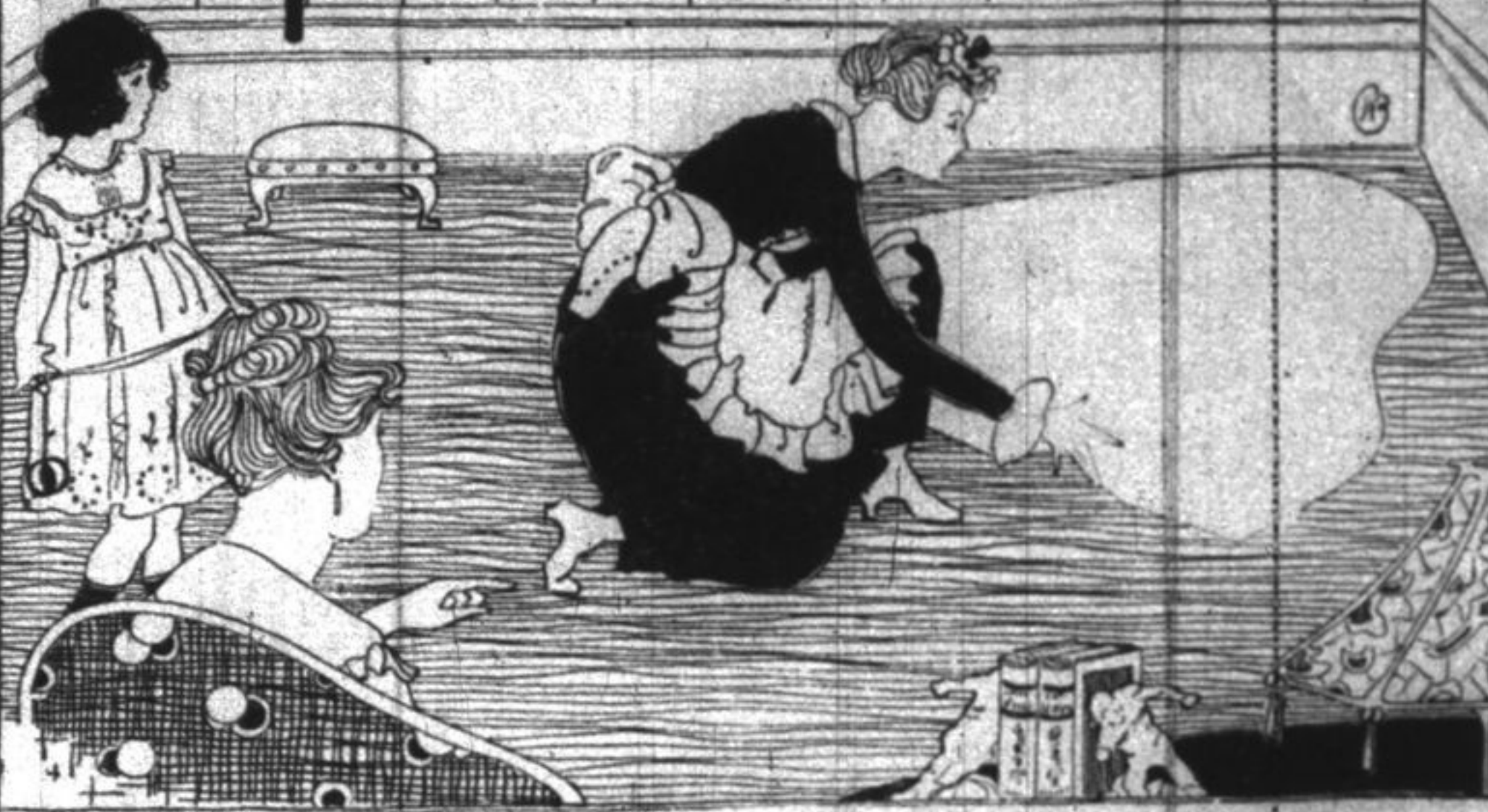

"A Christmas Message to the Women of America"

"As the holiday season approaches, the question which confronts us all is, 'What shall I do about Christmas? Shall I follow my usual plan and present to each of my friends such gifts as I have been in the habit of bestowing, or shall I refrain from doing so this year and expend all that I can afford upon our soldiers and the needy ones across the sea?'"

"It occurs to me that there are two ways in which we may keep Christmas green in the memories of our children, and that this, of all years of our lives, should be a children's Christmas year."

"Orphan children suffering from hunger and cold, who are helpless and homeless in our own and foreign lands, are calling to us for this sacrifice of love of Him who said: 'Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these, ye have done it unto Me.'"

"Then let our committees everywhere throughout the Union do all in their power to aid in teaching the sublime lesson of the Master, that it is better to give than to receive."

The W. Y. C. A.

"What are you doing in the Great War?" is the question asked of every organization worthy of the privilege of working with young men or women these days. We have pretty thoroughly learned what the Y. M. C. A. is doing, and next Sunday we are all to be given an opportunity to learn what its counterpart, the Y. W. C. A., is doing in the Great War. At the outset the government and the Y. M. C. A. both turned to this great national organization recognizing the necessity of protective work among girls if their own work was to be effective. The Y. M. C. A. gave \$50,000 from its War Fund to start the work of the Woman's War Council, which is now carrying on work in all the countries at war, as well as in all centers affected by war at home. What the nature of this work is, in all its intensely interesting branches, we are to learn at the home of Mrs. John Tuttle, 605 Prospect Ave., on Sunday afternoon at 3:30. A general invitation is extended to both men and women. Mrs. Emma Byers and Miss Frances Greenough, both secretaries of the National Staff will speak as well as a representative from the Great Lakes station who will describe the purpose and use to which the attractive Hostess House just being erected there will be put. If you want to keep abreast of the times and be thoroughly intelligent as to what is being done for the millions of young women affected by this war, you will be among "those present" at Mrs. Tuttle's charming home.

Red Cross Shop

It is indicative of the increased consciousness of war needs, and the corresponding response, that 53 pairs of socks have been turned in during the last two weeks as compared with 68 pairs completed during the 5 months from the opening of the shop on May 9th, to Oct. 15th. With these few days comes a special call for helmets and rifle mits. Free directions and wool for both these are to be had at the shop. Experienced knitters are needed for these articles. Col. Holland of Camp Grant says the boys with helmets are the envy of everyone. Let's eliminate envy in this branch of the service at least, by seeing that there are enough for all who need them.

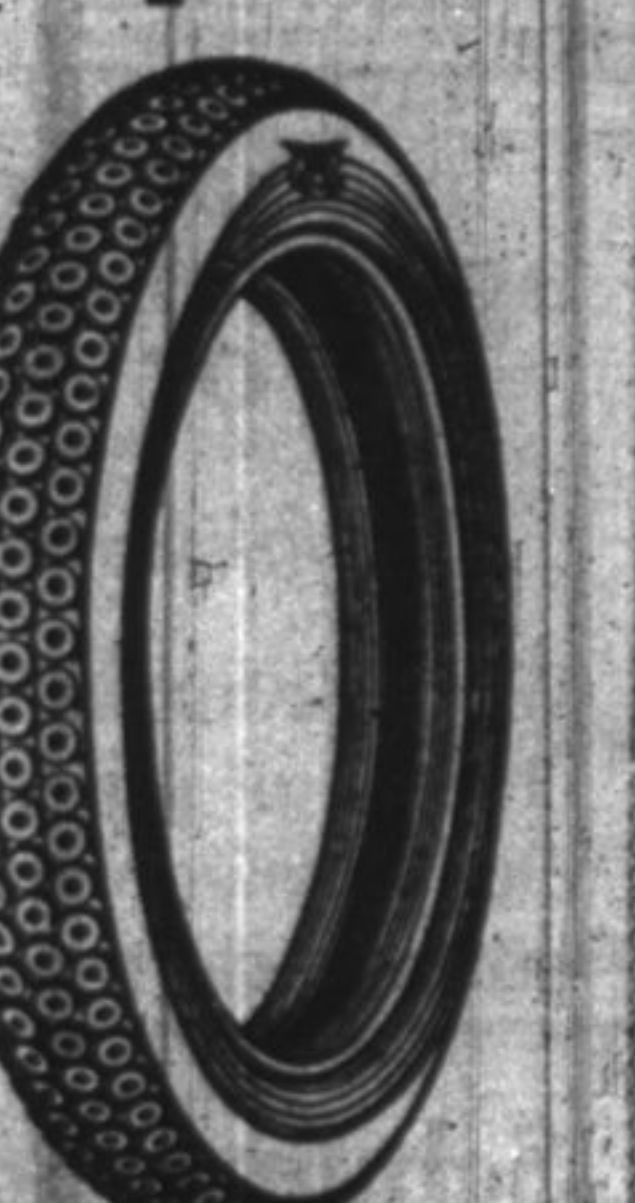
