POSTMASTER EXAM-INATION, JANUARY 12

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is an-

The examination is open to all citi-I zens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D C., at the earliest practicable date.

"We are buying all the yarn we are able to secure that is suitable for knitters, and are sending it out to the chapters as fast as we can get P. 405. delivery of it.

"We have received from the chapters about 200,000 sweaters, all which have been delivered to the men in the camps and training stations, with the exception of a few thousand which we have had to send to France."

"We call upon the women to give us their very best efforts from now until at least January 1, that we may he able to furnish our own men with these comforts, and have some to spare for the dire needs in France.


