National Council of Defense Ask Civilians' Cooperation in Wool Conservation

gone "over the top" in regard to cloth conservation. They have received a notice from the National Council of Defense at Washington, D. C. which recommends that clothing manufacturers should avoid models which use cloth for needless adornments, such as belts on coats, cuffs on sleeves, unnecessary pleats, full peg top trousers, etc., which wastes labor and wool at a time when they are urgently needed by the Army and for other essential uses.

They are duty bound by the request from Washington to do all in their power to conserve the resources of our country, including the wools and labor of the clothing industry.

In compliance with the above request they will, therefore, on and after the first of January, 1918, discontinue making garments with needless adornments, such as belts on coats, cuffs on sleeves, unnecessary pleats, full peg top trousers, etc.

At a patriotic service they know that their patrons will do their part.
