**NEW COAL RATES BY FUEL ADMINISTRATOR**

**NEW SET OF GROSS MARGINS**

Lake County Fuel Administrator L. P. Erskine Issues Schedule of Gross Margins Allowed to Dealers

Lake County Fuel Administration Erskine last week made public a new set of gross margins allowed retail dealers by the fuel administration. Following is Mr. Erskine's letter to dealers:

"Enclosed find gross margin sheet approved by the Lake County federal fuel administration committee known as District No. 6, January 10, and approved by the state federal fuel administrator Jan. 14, 1918. You are hereby notified to sell all coal, both anthracite and bituminous, at prices not to exceed cost f. o. b. at your station plus the gross margin of profit as shown by the enclosed gross margin profit sheet.

"If you find this gross margin sheet to be unsatisfactory we will be pleased to have you report same to the Lake county federal fuel administration."

Here's the New Schedule. Then follows this statement of the new gross margins:

When delivery is made in half ton lots and less, we recommend the following prices:

An additional delivery charge of 20 cents may be added on all grades of coal when delivered in half ton lots or less.

Anthracite in less than half ton lots, when delivered in 100 pound sacks can be sold for 60 cents per bag with no extra charge for carrying.

Bituminous coal in less than half ton lots when delivered in 60 pound sacks can be sold for 35 cents per sack with no other charge for carrying.

An extra charge can be added to the above prices when coal is carried from wagon or trucks as follows:

Coal carried in first floor or basement	35 \$ .20
Second floor	60 .35
Third floor	85 .50

The foregoing prices shall apply to all of District No. 6, Lake county, with this exception, to-wit: Where coal is obtained from the docks at Waukegan by wagon or truck there shall be deducted from said prices 40 cents per ton on anthracite and 30 cents per ton on bituminous coal.
