NEW SET OF GROSS MARGINS

Lake County Fuel Administrator L. P. Erskine Issues Schedule of Gross Margins Allowed to Dealers

Lake County Fuel Administration Erskine last week made public a new set of gross margins allowed retail dealers by the fuel administration. Following is Mr. Erskine's letter

"Enclosed find gross margin sheet approved by the Lake County federal fuel administration committee known as District No. 6, January 10, and approved by the state federal fuel administrator Jan. 14, 1918. You are hereby notified to sell all coal, both anthracite and bituminous, at prices not to exceed cost f. o. b. at your station plus the gross margin of profit as shown by the enclosed gross margin profit sheet.

"If you find this gross margin sheet to be unsatisfactory we will be pleased to have you report same to the Lake county federal fuel administra-
