The first speaker was Capt. Cassela of Glencoe who gave a very instructive talk on the subject of military law and its relation to the civil law, this subject was very ably handled by Captain Cassela and brought out a great deal of discussion which was both interesting and beneficial.

Captain Howard was the next speaker, his subject was "The tactical side of riot duty," this duty he characterized as the most dangerous, disagreeable and thankless duty that the ill. Reserve Militia will most likely be called upon to perform, the tactics to be used and the problems to be met with in this kind of duty requires that the men be better trained, better disciplined and under more complete control of the commander than in any other line of duty, calls for quick action and great determination and confidence on the part of the men.

The opponents not being trained or organized and having no definite object it is necessary for the company to act quickly in order to disintegrate and stampede the mob, the mob, he compares in spirit to fire it must be checked and controlled.

General discussion followed concerning street formations for riot duty which was very instructive.
