NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to all persons interested, that the Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highwood, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having let the contract for the construction of a grading, draining, paving and otherwise improving a portion of Prairie Avenue and Railway Avenue, in the City of Highwood, Lake County, Illinois, and the same having been completed and accepted by the said Board of Local Improvements on the 15th day of October A. D. 1917, and the said Board of Local Improvements having filed in the County Court of Lake County, Illinois on the 30th day of January A. D. 1918, a certificate showing that the said improvement conforms substantially to the requirements of the original ordinance for the construction of the same, the cost thereof, the amount estimated by them to be required to pay the accruing interest on bonds or vouchers issued to anticipate the collection of the assessment for said improvement. GERMAN ALIEN ENEMIES REGISTER THIS WEEK

Five Men Have Registered and a Number of Applications Are Filed at Local Post Office

After eight o'clock Saturday evening it will be too late for all German Alien Enemies to register at the local post office.

In accordance with the President's Proclamation dated November 16, 1917, all male German alien enemies of fourteen years of age and upward residing in this post office district are required to register under the direction of the Postmaster, who has been appointed Assistant Registrar.

This registration commenced at 8 a. m. on February 4th, and will continue up to and including the 9th day of February 1918 at 8 p. m.

PERSONS REQUIRED TO REGISTER: All natives, citizens, denizens or subjects of the German Empire, or Imperial German Government, being males of the age of fourteen years and upwards, who are within the United States and not actually naturalized as American citizens are required to register as alien enemies. The fact of having first or declarant papers, or a permit for restricted zones issued by the United States Marshal, does not exempt the possessor thereof from registering as a German alien enemy.

German alien enemies are hereby directed to report to the post office located in the district in which they reside.

Each German alien enemy is required to bring with him to the place of registration four photographs not larger than 3x3 inches, on thin paper with light background. At the place of registration he will be given full instructions as to procedure in filling application for registration.

An alien enemy required to register and who fails to complete his registration within the time fixed therefor, in addition to all other penalties prescribed by law, is liable to restraint, imprisonment and detention for the duration of the war.

Up to today five men have registered and a number of applications have been made.

ence he shot at him, using up all his ammunition and returned home for more. When he returned, Flynn had gone to the Severson home to get a gun and ammunition. When he saw that Clinton was intent on killing him he fired twice, killing Clinton.

It was a real gun fight between the two men for some minutes, the argument being settled after Flynn had a very close escape from being killed when one of the bullets from Clinton revolver struck his watch and was deflected. The presence of the watch undoubtedly saved Flynn's life.

Flynn, also about 40 years of age has a family who live in Highwood. Clinton also had a family and had lived in Highland Park many years. He has done various kinds of labor work.

Deputy Coroner Edward Conrad went to Highwood Friday afternoon to hold an inquest over what has developed into a rather mysterious shooting affair, the actual facts of which were hard to obtain from the authorities, who declared they knew very little about it.

Flynn has handled the distribution of Chicago newspapers for some time and is well known along the north shore.

Immediately following the shooting he surrendered himself to the marshal of Highwood and was placed in arrest pending developments at the coroner's inquest. The verdict of which was to the effect that Flynn had killed Clinton in self defense and was therefore exonerated.

Clinton's funeral was held on Monday, the Knights of Pythias having charge.

DEFENSE COUNCIL HELPS IN DEATH STORY

Letter Written by Belgian Soldier to Gottfried Arnswald is Turned Over to War Department

Recently Mr. Gottfried Arnswald of Glenview Ave. received a letter from a Belgian soldier stating that Carl Arnswald was dead, that he had seen a notice to that effect in a newspaper at the Belgian front. In the letter the writer expressed the hope that Mr. Arnswald would send him some money. The letter was evidently written for the purpose of soliciting funds.

It was turned over to Mr. George A. Mason of the Defense Council of Highland Park by the family who discredited the news it carried. Mr. Mason immediately notified the War

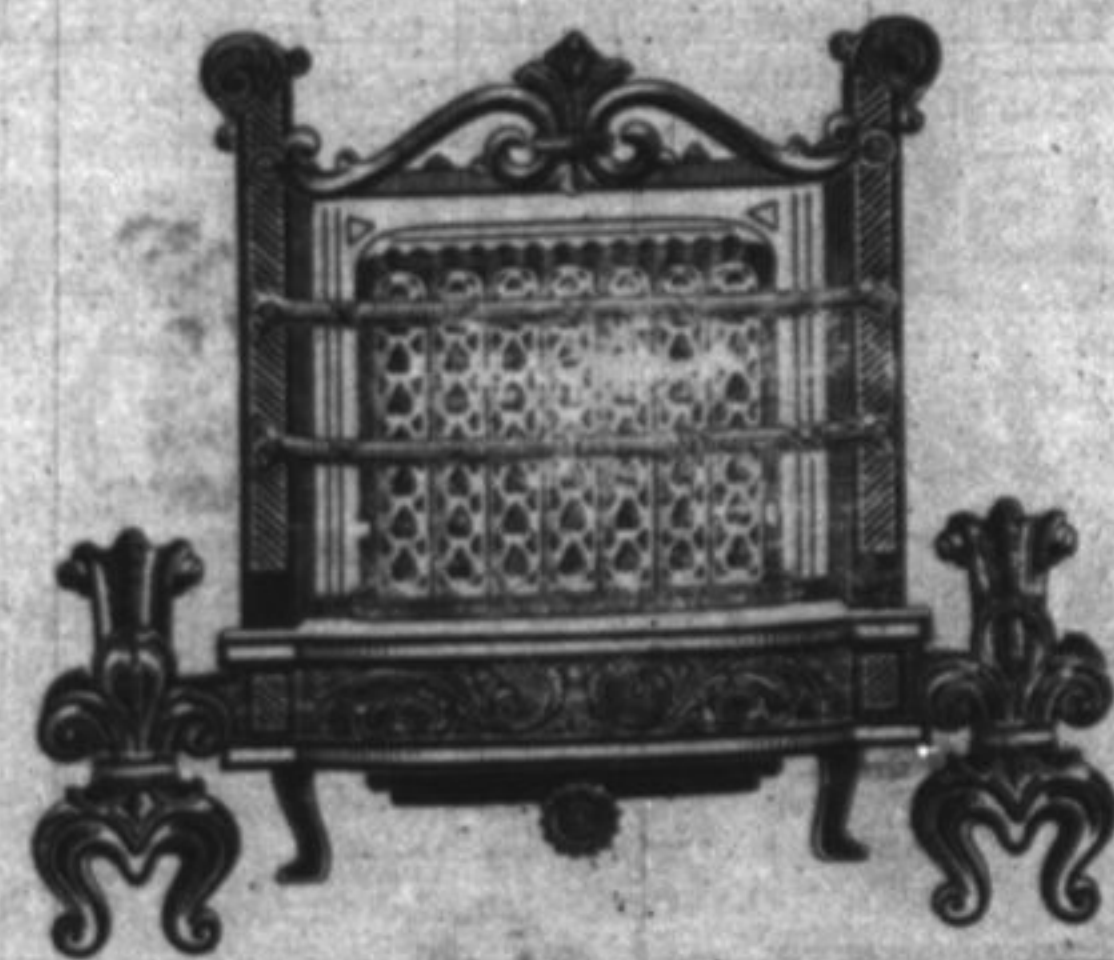

Employers have had strong preference for younger women, but since it has become necessary to substitute women for men, many executives are finding that with equal special training given the older woman with varied experience proves more valuable than the younger competitor.

CHANGE IN METHOD OF CALLING LONG DISTANCE

To quicken the service between Highland Park, Waukegan and Evanston, the Chicago Telephone Co. has arranged a new method of handling calls. Under the new plan the connection will be established by the local operator, and the call, therefore, will not go to the long distance operator. This change will be effective Tuesday, February 5, 1918.
