Where are all the Women who Registered for WORK in the RED CROSS SHOP?

From the registration cards made by the Womens Committee of National Defense we find over six hundred women in Highland Park pledged themselves to give to Red Cross work from half a day to two or three days a week. This Registration was not compulsory, these women voluntarily promised to give the aid necessary to save the lives of American men and boys at the front,

The records at the Red Cross Shop show an average of not more than twenty five workers a day. If the women who pledged themselves for this work were doing their duty the average would be a hundred a day instead of twenty five. And even a hundred a day would not mean that Highland Park women were doing their best.

The origin of the well known phrase "Do your bit" was "Do your full duty and then a bit more." American women have the example of their English and Canadian sisters before them, those splendid women who have stood by their Government, giving their men and themselves. Are we so selfish and pleasure loving that we cannot make the small sacrifice of a few hours a week to turn out the Surgical dressings and garments vital to the lives of the men and boys who are so steadily leaving ush

It is time we put personal feeling away. Suppose we do think the "red tape" of the Red Cross ridiculous, the care with which the surgical dressings are made too fussy, the sewing department not quite to our liking. Shall we forget we are citizens of the great United States which has never been beaten and which is now involved in the most terrible death struggle this Nation has ever known? Shall we fail our government, our brave men and boys who are so willingly offering up their lives to make our Country a place of safety for us to live in.

Women of Highland Park it is time to wake up and do your duty! The American Red Cross carries to our wounded lying desolate "somewhere in France" the supplies vital for life. These supplies are made by the women and if we fail the lives of thousands will be lost.

The Central Red Cross Shop is in the Presbyterian .Church rooms and is fully equipped with materials of all kinds for surgical dressings and garments.

Your Country needs your help. Come and do your best and a bit more. The Shop is open every day except Saturday from nine to four.
