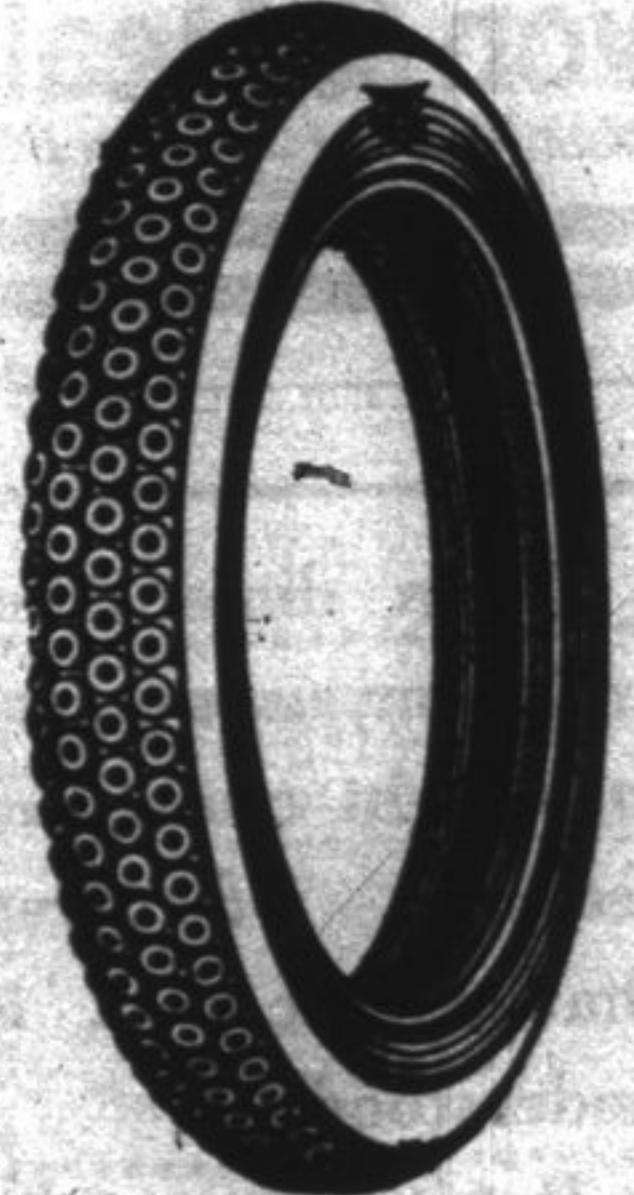

PROGRESS OF ILLINOIS DURING 100 YEARS

Director of Centennial Celebration Gives Striking Address at Illinois Farmers Institute Tuesday

The great progress of the state of Illinois in one hundred years of statehood was strikingly presented in an address to the Illinois Farmers Institute at Bloomington, Tuesday, by Hugh S. Magill, Jr., Director of the Centennial Celebration. No one a hundred years ago could have imagined the achievements that have been attained, Director Magill declared.

"One hundred years ago Illinois was admitted into the American Union," he said. "The first century of her history is a wonderful story. Her raw prairies have become rich productive farms. Pioneer settlements have developed into villages and villages into great cities. Where one hundred years ago stood lonely Fort Dearborn, today stands one of the greatest cities of the world.

"No human mind however powerful its imagination, could have dreamed of the things that have actually come to pass. So marvelous has been the material progress of the past century, that a history of those years transcends the most imaginative fiction. We are so busy in the use and employment of our modern inventions that we are likely to forget how recently they have come into use.

"Illinois had been a state for twenty years before we had a railroad. All the uses of electricity—the telegraph, the telephone, the electric motor, electric lights, and a score of other uses have been developed during the past century. The same is true of the gas engine which has made possible the automobile and the airplane. The motion picture and the phonograph have had a tremendous influence upon our recreation, while numberless inventions have revolutionized our industry.

"In no line has there been greater progress than in agriculture. The rude primitive implements have been laid aside for modern farm machinery. Successful farming has become one of the most scientific occupations. This war has demonstrated that in the analysis the thing most important is food. Money, munitions, even men, cannot win without provisions, and so even greater progress must be made in order that the supply from our farms shall meet the demands of our people.
