Letters from Our Boys

Harry Wilson
 The following letter was written to Mr. R. E. Winter of Highwood, by Mr. Harry Wilson who joined the Canadian forces and was seriously wounded in the battle of Vimy Ridge, Lancashire, England, October 30, 1917
 Dear Friend Mr. Winter:
 Received your postal card some time ago but you must excuse me for not answering sooner. I was not feeling very good at the time, but I am getting stronger every day. I had a pretty hard old knock. I was wounded in both legs and a few other minor places, but I am doing very nicely at the present. Mr. Winter, I am certainly well satisfied over in your native country. It is certainly a beautiful country to be proud of and what the boys of Great Britain have done in this great struggle with the Hun! You can rely upon it too that they are not half through yet, the English people spare nothing for the colonial troops and especially for the Canadian. When this great struggle is over Canada certainly can be proud of the boys who came over to do their bit and are still giving the Hun what he needs. There are lots of the boys over here from the states in the Canadian lines. From every state in the union and especially from our own home town. Well, Mr. Winters I have been a good boy and I have been treated well. I can hardly explain while over in France and here in England. I have done my little bit like a man and was treated the same way.

Lieut. John W. Brown
 The following is an extract of a letter from Lieut. John Brown, Battery C. 449th F. A., with the American Expeditionary Forces in France. It was written to his sister, Miss Margaretta Brown.
 "Young Borgen is a caisson corporal in this battery and a good one. Of course I see a lot of him as he is in charge of the drivers in his section."
 "Yes Bob, Hussey was at the school with me and was sent to another regiment. I knew him well and liked him immensely. He will make a fine officer, very sincere and very attractive and a real fellow."

Liberty Loan Essay Contest
 The National Committee of patriotic Societies during the Second Liberty Loan campaign instituted a prize essay contest on the subject, "There should be a Liberty Bond in every home."
 More than three thousand essays were submitted and the first prize, a Fifty Dollar Liberty Loan Bond, was awarded to Morris Wolf, of the Business High School, Washington, D. C. Other contestant schools ranking high in order of excellence were the Dunbar High School, Washington, the Joliet (Ill.) High School, the McKinley Manual Training School of Washington the Gilman School, Roland Park, Md., the Northwestern Military Academy, Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, the Deerfield-Shields High School, Highland Park, Ill., the Eastern High School of Washington, and the Hindman Settlement School of Kentucky.
 The essays were limited to 600 words and every school competing was required to have a campaign for the sale of Liberty Bonds. The total sale of bonds resulting from these campaigns went into the millions. The Gilman Country School of Maryland led the list, purchasing \$60,000 worth of bonds.
 The National Committee of Patriotic Societies, which has its headquarters in Washington, will hold a similar contest during the Third Liberty Loan campaign and hopes to have every high school in the United States competing.

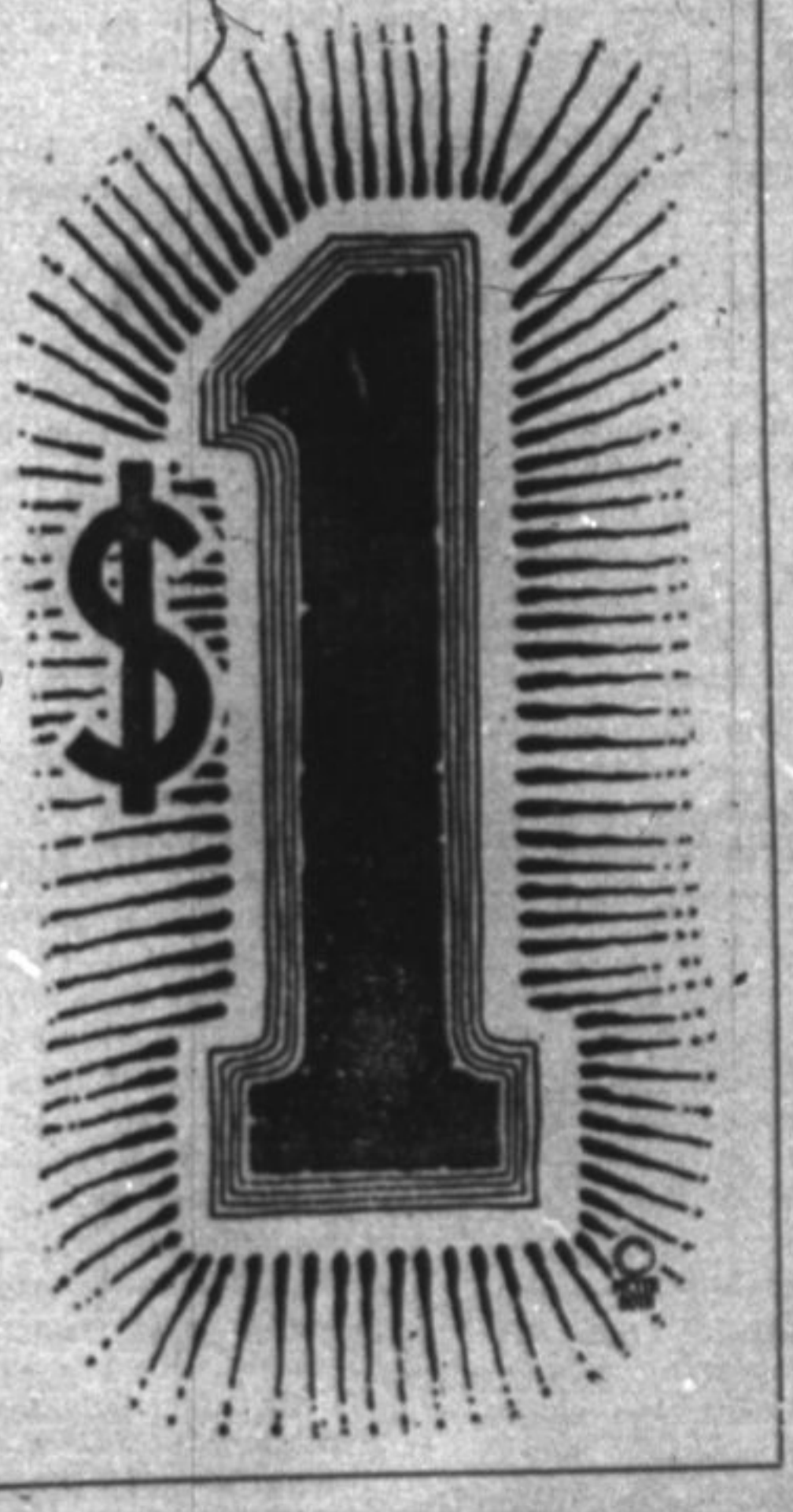
