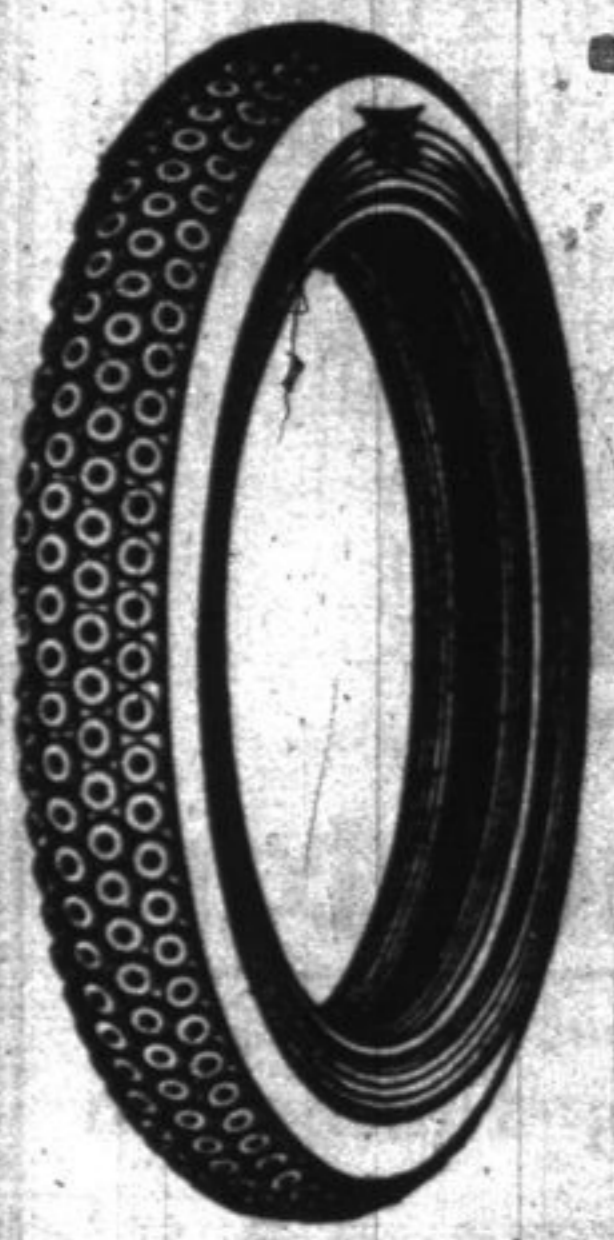

PARENTS AND TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

The Health and Hygiene commit-
tee of the High School P. T. A.,
of which Mrs. J. T. Wadsworth
is chairman, had charge of the meet-
ing of the Association held Monday af-
ternoon in the English Club room.
Dr. John E. Kaufman, physical di-
rector at the Great Lakes naval train-
ing station spoke on Athletics as re-
lated to Military Preparedness.

ELM PLACE SCHOOL

The sale of thrift stamps has con-
tinued with a high degree of success.
Each of the rooms marks its pro-
gress by a diagram on which is a
picture of a large thermometer.
When the bulb is colored with red
ink fifty per cent of the pupils of the
grade have thrift stamps and as the
percentages increases the red ink is
made to rise in the stem of the ther-
mometer. Four of the rooms have
thermometers linked to the top of the
stem which means that every pupil
in the room is a buyer of thrift stamps.
The sales from the office have been
running from \$10 to \$15 worth a day.

The first move in the garden cam-
paign for the coming season was
made on Wednesday when the fifth
grade pupils planted their tomato
seeds in flats in the planthouse.
When the plants are well above the
ground, the flats will be transferred
to the hotbeds out-of-doors. The
