HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

Last Monday in General Assembly Mr. Sandwick gave a very interesting talk on his trip and experiences in the East, where he attended a convention held by the superintendents of schools throughout the country. At Washington he met Mr. Ball, our former Chemistry teacher, who is now in charge of a branch of Trench Military Warfare, having under him sixty chemists who are working on gases and explosives. He said an aerial torpedo was recently invented there which carries a hundred miles and contains an explosive which will wreck a city.

Mr. Sandwick spoke of President Wilson's letter to the educators of the country in which he urged that boys and girls be kept in school as long as possible. The need of scientists, engineers and all kind of trained workers is very great and will continue to be so in the reconstruction period which will follow the war.

At the convention in Atlantic City plans were discussed regarding the advisability of dividing the school year into four quarters of twelve weeks each. The plan is favored by many and may go into effect before long.

Mr. Sandwick also had a talk with Carl Rommel, one of our former students. Mr. Rommel has invented the method for making the star shells which the Germans use so advantageously and which are, as yet, practically unknown to the Allies.

At the Convention, addresses were given by the governors of New York and New Jersey, and by Congressman Stevens of Nebraska. Mr. Stevens told wonderful stories of life "over there." He stood at Verdun where five Frenchmen had repulsed the attack of the Huns; and he had been at Vimy Ridge where the Germans were defeated.

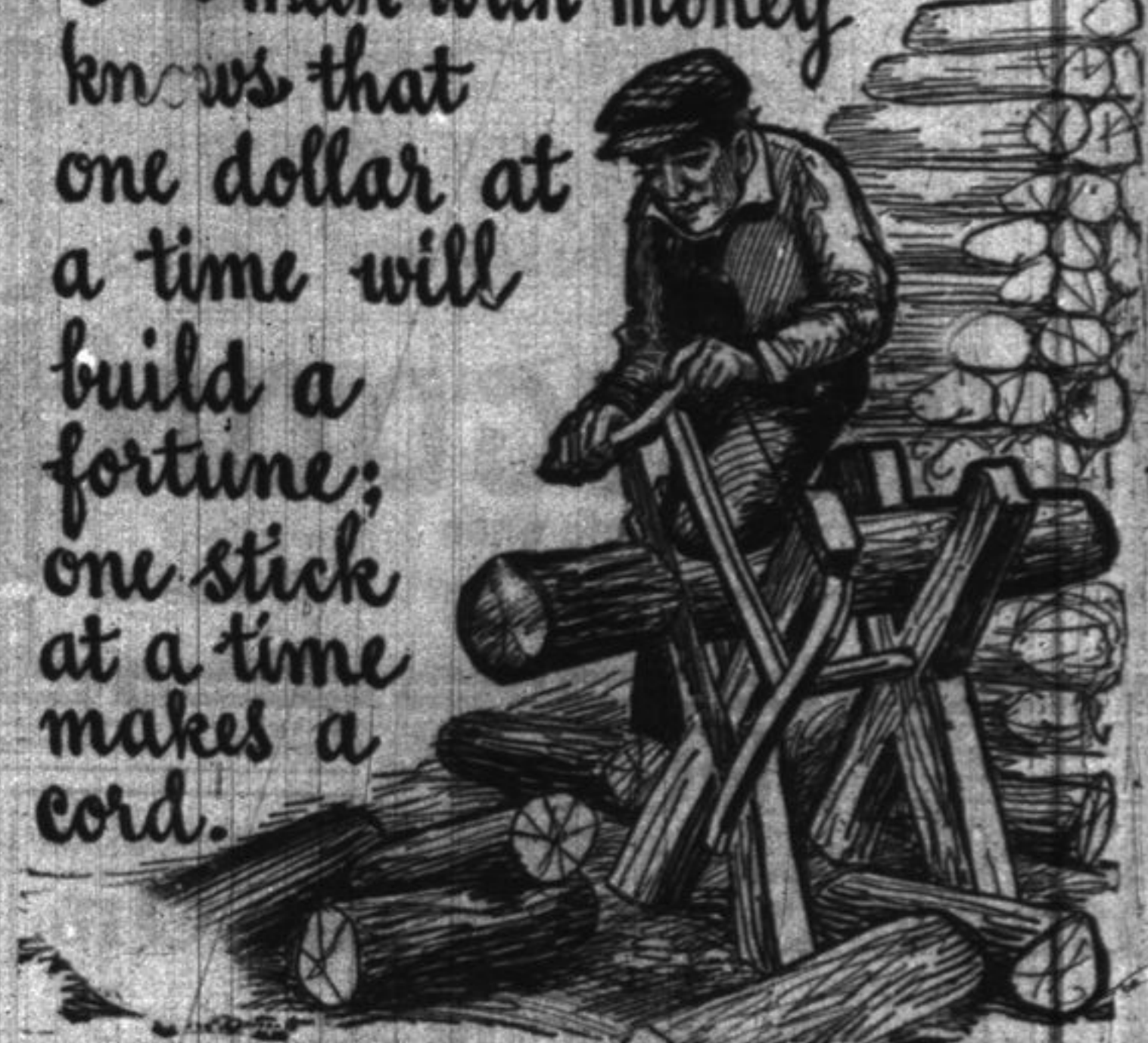
