**RED CROSS MAKES APPEAL**

The Women, Children and Aged of Belgium and Conquered France Are in Need of Clothing

This week, March 18th to 23rd, the people of Highland Park are being given an opportunity to do their bit in an easy and soul-satisfying way. This time, time, and sympathy are asked for, instead of money and the Red Cross has made an appeal which cannot fail to reach our hearts.

The women, children and aged men of Belgium and the conquered portions of France are in great need of clothing and we have been asked to help by giving what used clothing we can spare.

These are the tens of thousands who could not get away into France when their country was invaded, and who have lived for three years under the terrible rule of Germany, many of them close behind the German line. They would have starved but for the help the Red Cross and the Commission for Relief in Belgium was able to give them, hampered always by the iron hand of the German army. Many have died, many have been carried into slavery, but there are still thousands living and in want.

In all these years they have never had any new stock of cloth for garments or leather for shoes; so imagine (what condition their apparel must be in with all the cleaning and patching and mending. They are in rags.

And now the people and armies of the allied nation need all the cloth and leather in the world, and more. There is not in the world as much material as is needed. What we are asked to do is to divide the clothes we have with these unfortunate ones who have nothing.

This appeal leaves a very short time in which to work, and necessarily some people may be overlooked when the one in charge of your district is making her requests for clothing. If you will notify the Red Cross Shop or Miss Mary L. Sedgwick, someone will call at your home and get the clothing.

Here is a list of the clothes needed:  
Men's Wear: Shirts (preferably of light colored flannel), undershirts, undershirts, sweaters, trousers, coats, work suits (overalls), suits (3 piece), shoes, overcoats, jerseys, socks.  
Women's Wear: Shirts, drawers, corset-slips, petticoats, blouses, skirts, overcoats, suits (2 piece), pinafores, shoes, cloth hats, knitted caps, stockings, shawls.

Boys' and Girl's Wear: Hooded capes, pinafore, woolen union suits.  
Infant's Wear: Swanskins swaddling clothes, cradle chemises, bodices, cradle dresses, socks, bonnets, bibs, neckerchiefs, diapers, shoes, baby dresses, hooded capes, jackets, shawls, sweaters.

Miscellaneous: Bed-ticks, bed sheets pillow cases, blankets, mufflers.

**COMPANY C APPEARS IN BATTALION DRILL**

A hasty call was sent out to members of Company C, Sunday morning ordering them to report at the armory, the high school at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. Bayonet exercises, manual of arms, and riot drills were all included in the demonstration.

At sunset the men drew up at the flag pole on E. Central Ave. and stood at parade rest while the drums sounded off. All Fort Sheridan men who were on the scene stood at attention during the sounding of retreat.

The affair was very impressive, and it was inspiring to see the home men who for the past year have so unselfishly devoted their time and energy to the study of soldiering, appear before us Sunday afternoon. There were nearly 400 in line.
