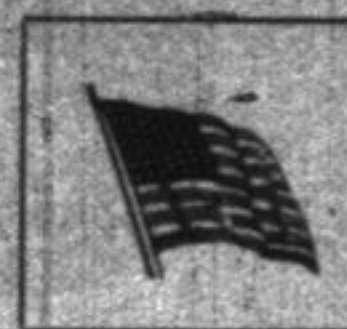

VIGOROUS CAMPAIGN ON WAR SAVING STAMPS

EIGHT IN MAXIMUM CLUB

Highland Park Stands Third in Per Capita Basis and Second in Total Sales in Lake County

The campaign for the advertising of the War Savings Stamps is proceeding vigorously this week under the leadership of Mr. Clarence W. Diver of Waukegan chairman of the Speakers Committee.

The Waukegan Rifle and Drum Corps is accompanying the speakers throughout the county.

Meetings will be held Tuesday night, March 26th at Lake Zurich and Wauconda and on Wednesday, March 27th at Halfday, at Garnea, Lake Villa and other towns later in the week.

The County Executive Committee is fortunate in securing the services of Mr. George F. Goodnow of Highland Park as chairman for the Maximum War Savings Club of the county. There are already enrolled in this club membership in which signifies that the members have subscribed amount of Savings Stamps allotted to any one person in one year:

It is absolutely essential that this club grow rapidly if Lake County is to subscribe its per capita quota, required by the government.

Mr. John B. Whitney, the efficient township chairman for Deerfield has obtained the cooperation of the patriotic managers of the local theaters in having Thrift maxims and jingles thrown on the screen.

The campaign in the schools is increasing in intensity and effectiveness and over 100 people have already reported in giving aid by the chain letter system throughout the county.

EAST PARK DISTRICT ELECTION APRIL 2nd

One Commissioner for a Full Term of Five Years to be Elected. Hoerman Withdraws

On Tuesday, April 2nd an election will be held in the Highland Park East Park District for the purpose of electing one commissioner for the full term of five years. Mr. W. C. Egan who has held the office for the past nine years is the retiring member. He is not up for reelection. Two candidates, Mr. Lawrence Buck of Marshman and Bronson Streets and Mr. Carl Hoerman of Judson Avenue, have filed petitions. Since filing his petition Mr. Hoerman writes The Press that he has ceased to be a candidate. This leaves Mr. Buck with no opposition. The polling place will be at the office of James Duffy, corner of Central Avenue and Sheridan Road.

TOWNSHIP ELECTION TUESDAY, APRIL SECOND

ONLY ONE COMPLETE TICKET

Assistant Supervisor, Township Clerk, Assessor and Commissioner of Highways to be Elected

On Tuesday, April second will be held the annual township meeting and election of officers of Deerfield township. This year the offices to be filled are: one Assistant Supervisor, one Township Clerk, and one commissioner of highway. The present incumbents are running for reelection on the Citizen's Ticket: A. W. Vercoe for Assistant Supervisor, Albert Larson for Clerk, James Duffy for Assessor and John Freberg for commissioner of highways. On the Independent Ticket, T. M. Dooley is opposing Albert Larson for Township Clerk and on the People's Ticket E. E. Farmer is opposing John Freberg for commissioner of Highways. The other candidates have no opposition.

This election is the first since the abolition of the office of township collector by a law recently enacted by the legislature. Hereafter personal property and real estate taxes will be paid to the county treasurer in Waukegan.

SMILEAGE BOOK DRIVE TO START HERE SOON

Charles Harbaugh, Local Chairman Will be Assisted by the High School Cadets

Our government has built one theatre in each National Army Cantonment, seating three thousand.

The entertainment given in those theatres will be under the supervision of the Military Entertainment of the Commission on Training Camp Activities, Washington, D. C.

Admission to these entertainments will be by coupon, these coupons are sold on books of one and five dollars each, the one dollar books containing twenty and the five dollar books one hundred coupons, the sale of these books are under the authority of the Government and the accounts are added by the War Department.

These books may be sent to relatives or friends or sent direct to the Army Cantonment for distribution.

The Military Entertainment Council hopes to sell more than a million of these books so that every soldier may be provided with one or more. The campaign has already been started in other nearby cities and the books are being sold in large numbers.

The drive in Highland Park will be started as soon as the necessary supplies are received, Charles Harbaugh has been appointed chairman of the local committee and with the assistance of the High School Cadets expects to start the campaign very soon.

The people of Highland Park will be advised beforehand through the columns of the Press and otherwise of the date on which the drive is to begin, so that the citizens will be anticipating it and will cheerfully and patriotically respond.

Let all take part in this campaign and help to put a "Smile That Won't Come Off" on the face of our boys in the training camps.

We expect that the citizens of Highland Park will fully sustain the reputation made in other campaigns of like character and thereby help to make happy so far as possible those boys who are giving so much for their country.

Fritz Bahr Makes Plain, in the Following Statement, His Attitude in the Present World Crisis

While it is not likely that any of my friends and neighbors will question my attitude in the present crisis, an article, however which appeared last Sunday in one of the Chicago papers with a misrepresentation of facts concerning me, might create a wrong impression on some of our good citizens with whom I am not as yet acquainted. I am making the following statement in Justice to myself and others who feel as I do.

"The position of any German-American in this dark hour is not one to be envied, and yet every true one is deserving credit for overcoming or outliving that which in his earlier years have been impressed and instilled into him regarding the old Fatherland and is contrary to the principles of a Democracy. Myself and thousands of others came here in order to escape, so to speak, Prussian Militarism.

We must acknowledge the wonderful accomplishments, scientific, and otherwise of the German people, but they have dragged with them the chains of a military system which, while in the hopes of perpetuating itself has not only outlived its usefulness, but has become the curse of that nation.

The people of this little earth don't differ much, to me they are all alike, but by the aid of imaginary boundary lines which divide them, through environment and education their minds

can be moulded into all sorts of shapes and the great mass made to think along certain lines and the king, prince of potentate has been ever ready to take advantage of this fact. Ever since the world knew of rulers and conquest, tyranny and oppression has been the rule. Caesar, Czar and Kaiser, these three words stand for the same and mean the same. All of us in America are aware of the fact that we are in this struggle to wipe out what is left of these three.

What Thomas Paine thought would happen inside of 25 years after the American Revolution, namely the end of every monarchy, will be the result of this war. What Lincoln said, in reference to the North and the South, "A House divided against itself cannot stand" has become a world question, there is no room for both the Autocratic Monarchy and the Free Republic.

These are my honest convictions and no one can be more deeply impressed with the meaning of it all. While I and millions of others hope that something unforeseen or thought of may happen to stop this horrible slaughter a decision has to be reached by the sword, a dark tomorrow is in front of us and great sacrifices will have to be made. I am ready to assist the government in whatever I can do and with every cent I have if necessary and consider it a sacred duty and privilege."

ORIGINATES PATRIOTIC WAR BREAD RECIPE

Carrie Foshender Feldman Concocts Idea of Inexpensive Bread. City Editor Endorses It

The following recipe for war bread was sent into the City Editor this week with the request that it be published.

It was originated by Carrie Foshender Feldman, a Highland Park girl. Now the City Editor is more or less skeptical on the subject of war bread, and it was decided "to try it on the dog" first, well not exactly the dog, but rather the family. The City Editor, aside from her editing is something of a housekeeper, and as a good part of her housework consists of cooking, the trying of the bread was quite easily accomplished. The family "fell" for it at once and the Press is very glad to endorse it. It is at once good and cheap. The recipe follows:

- War Bread
- 1 cup rye flour,
 - 1 cup of corn meal,
 - 1 cup of oat meal,
 - 1 cup of white flour,
 - ½ cup of seeded raisins,
 - 2 teaspoons of sugar,
 - 1½ cups of milk or water,
 - 2 tablespoons of shortening,
 - 3 tablespoons of baking powder,
 - 1 teaspoon of salt.
- Bake for 40 minutes.

Rev. R. Calvin Dobson Organizing New Y. M. C. A. in Miami, Florida

It is stated that the physical department will provide for recreation and relaxation in the form of games, more than exercise, such as baseball, volleyball, basketball, medicine ball, playground ball, tennis, quots and checkers."

TRANSPORT CO. INCOMPLETE

Highland Park Behind Other North Shore Cities in the Organization of its Transport Train

Highland Park is very backward in organizing its Transport Company, which is an adjunct to Company C, Illinois Reserve Militia. To any one who visited the review held at Evanston Sunday afternoon this is very evident, for Evanston has over forty cars enlisted in the service and other cities along the North Shore have more than their quota of cars already in service, while Highland Park so far has but seven of the necessary twenty.

Men of Highland Park, if you own and operate a five or seven passenger touring car, see to it that you become a member of the Transport Company immediately. If Company C should be called on riot duty it would be necessary to hunt up cars enough to transport them quickly. Not much is asked in this service, but that little will be of great assistance in time of need. Each member of this company has the rank of sergeant and is regularly enlisted in the service of state, subject to call when needed, but it is a duty which any one should be proud of.

A black mark stands against Highland Park in that it is so backward in getting this branch of the service organized.

Automobile owners are urgently requested to confer with Chas. Harbaugh and get their names on the list of cars which can be used when Company C is ordered out on short notice.

Company C will take part in the review and exhibition of the First Regiment at the Patten Gymnasium, Sunday, April 7th at 3 p. m. The different companies will give exhibitions of various movements and Company C will give a demonstration of bayonet exercise. This will be very interesting and the general public is invited to attend.

After the various companies of the Regiment have been through their exercise, a parade will be held on the Campus.

A great many people do not understand just what it means to enlist in the Illinois Reserve Militia but if it were not for this branch of the National Guard, the property of the state would be in jeopardy in case of riots, I. W. W. strikes or other public disturbances. The organization also affords a wonderful opportunity for the young men of draft age to secure a preliminary training. Almost every week, two or three of Company C men have to leave for the front, but having gone through the discipline under Capt. Turpin, they are better fitted than men who go with no former military experience whatever and inasmuch as Company C is constantly losing young men in this way, it behooves all the older men in Highland Park to see that the Company is kept up to its full quota.

Come to the drill next Monday night at the high school gymnasium and see for yourself what work is being accomplished under the able direction of Capt. Turpin.
