



MAJ. CARSON McCORMACK VISITS HIGHLAND PARK

Addresses Local Four Minute Men at the Home of Fayette S. Munro Sunday Evening

Jones, state chairman of the Four Minute Men, members of the local organization here had the privilege of hearing Major Carson McCormack last Sunday evening at the home of the local chairman, Fayette S.
