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ELM PLACE SCHOOL

Each little burst of warm weather these times reminds us that now it is well to renew one's acquaintance with out-of-doors. The frogs are beginning to sing in the marshes and it will soon be a good time to search the margins of ponds for floating masses of frog's eggs. It is worth while to bring back some of them and watch the specks grow into polliwogs. Crayfish now are very interesting. All winter long the females have been carrying their egg masses securely plastered to their swimmerettes. Now the young have hatched out and they, too, cling to the swimmerettes as the mother crawls along in the shallow water.

Many of the resident birds and some of the migrants are here. The robins seem to be numerous this year and the meadows are fairly vocal with meadowlarks. The horned larks are probably nesting by this time. The marshes resound with the calls of the redwinged black birds and the bronzed grackles are decorating the tree tops and now and then alighting on our lawns. The song sparrows have returned and their vespers can be heard along water courses or the margin of the lake. Great flocks of juncos and tree sparrows have come in. The blue bird, the loveliest of all our early birds, is here but apparently not in great numbers.

It is time to see that all the nesting boxes are thoroughly cleaned out and ready. It is also time to fasten bits of cloth, pieces of old string and odds and ends of that sort to bushes or trees to be availed of by bird architects. It will soon be worth while to keep a puddle of mud in an old shallow basin out on the lawn. This will be appreciated by various bird workmen.

The program of the Parent Teacher Meeting on last Wednesday afternoon was concerned largely with a practical talk by Mr. Fred Jackson of Lake Forest in gardening. Mr. Jackson has had many years experience in raising crops in the kind of soil found here at Highland Park and his directions as to treating the soil and as to time and methods of cultivation were unusually valuable. He had garden tools with him, the uses of which he explained. He recommends particularly the use of the very narrow hoe which he manufactures from the ordinary garden hoes, cutting the hoe back to make a sharp pointed tool. A hoe of this kind and a garden rake make up his recommended list of garden tools. He brought with him a very complete planting chart covering the entire growing season and embodying his experience of several years. In this chart he provided for so-called "catch crops" as well as permanent crops and gave the names of varieties of vegetables which his experience indicates are the best for this region. Blue print copies of his chart are being made for posting up at the school building and other copies will be available for distribution.

Mrs. George Greene outlined her experience with a backyard colony of wyandotte hens. This colony has been watched by many people of Highland Park with unusual interest and it is hoped to publish in a succeeding number of the Press a photograph of the equipment and a detailed statement of the methods employed in securing the results which have been obtained.
