FOREST PRESERVE AS A BIRD SANCTUARY

A HELP IN CONSERVATION

Birds Will Soon Discover Area and Many Species Which are Now Wanting May Come for Nesting Purposes

Mr. Louis Agassiz Puertes of Ithaca, New York, estimates that the rodent, insect and weed-seed eating birds are responsible for a salvage to the grain and fruit crop of the United States of not less than \$1,000,000,000 a year.

It has been demonstrated that in a remarkably short time wild life recognizes protection. The establishment of a forest preserve in Lake County would unquestionably restore much of the bird life that under present conditions is falling an easy prey to the lawless shooter...

The tremendous area of woodland available for this great public benefit in Cook County alone is so surprising that the average city dweller can scarcely comprehend the possibility.

The statement that there are 30,000 acres available and that already 12,

000 acres have been purchased and set aside should bring a realization of not only the far sighted vision of the men who were instrumental in having the Forest Preserve law enacted...

Our bird friends are not slow to recognize protection, and it is quite within the possibilities that many species that have not nested with us in recent years, may again find congenial surroundings in the protected area of our region.

OFFERS FIFTY-DOLLAR LIBERTY BOND AS PRIZE

RURAL SCHOOLS ELIGIBLE

School Selling the Most Liberty Bonds to Receive Gift from Governor Frank O. Lowden

Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois who once taught in a little one-room rural school house, has announced to the Woman's Committee of the Third Liberty Loan that he will give a fifty-dollar bond to the one room country school house selling the largest number of Liberty Bonds in proportion to their enrollment...

Mrs. Lowden, wife of the governor, will offer a fifty dollar bond to be given to the elementary city or village grade school public, private or parochial, selling the largest number of bonds in proportion to their enrollment.

Pullman Lowden, son of the governor, who is in the United States

army, will donate a fifty dollar bond to the high school in the state, public, private or parochial selling the largest number of Liberty Bonds in proportion to their enrollment.

The contest, under the direction of Mrs. Howard T. Wilson, state chairman for Illinois is for the purpose of encouraging the sale of bonds by the school children of the state and to give them an opportunity to share their burden in the war for freedom.

Governor Lowden has accompanied his offer with the following statement:

"This is a war in which the children of America have more to lose than anyone else, as the greater part of their lives lies before them. Therefore, if we lose, they will have more years short of all that makes life dear than we of maturer years. God grant that we may leave to these children the freedom and equality of opportunity which we ourselves inherited from our fathers."

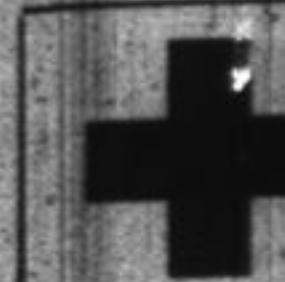
