

LAKE COUNTY BEHIND IN THRIFT STAMP QUOTA

SHOULD NOW HAVE \$350,000

Highland Park Now Stands Second Place in Both Per Capita and Total Amount Subscribed

The sales of War Savings and Thrift Stamps in the county up to date, excepting the sales of the Great Lakes Training Station, amount to less than \$100,000 while it should be \$350,000 to April 1st. The fact that only three counties in the state reached their quota does not decrease our responsibility nor lessen our need of subscription. The only way the county can go over the top, is by having a large number of maximum subscribers.

The campaign has been assisted materially during the past week, by the Third Liberty Bond salesmen. These salesmen, many of them have carried the pledges for weekly subscriptions to the Thrift Stamps in their pockets, and when they found a prospective customer who couldn't invest in the bonds, have signed him up for the Thrift Stamps. Every loyalist is subscribing for one or the other.

The young people are doing wonderful work under the system installed by county superintendent of schools, T. A. Sampson. The hard work and self-sacrifice of the children is certainly an example to the older generation, and is a wonderful encouragement to the committee. These young people are getting a training in patriotism which will produce glorious results for the commonwealth in the generation to come. If those who are able will show their appreciation of the work of the children by joining the Maximum Club, and putting the state of Illinois thereby, on a par with the state of Nebraska and others which are accomplishing their quota, our government will be able to accomplish the work they have planned.

SECRETARY DANIELS' LIQUOR PROCLAMATION

Five Mile Zone Order Prohibits Shipping Intoxicants into Territory Specified

There is hereby established a zone five miles wide circumjacent to the boundaries of Naval Stations in U. S. Alcoholic liquor, including beer, ale and wine, either alone or with any other article, shall not directly or indirectly be sold bartered given, served knowingly delivered by one person to another in any such zone, or sent, shipped, transmitted, carried or transported to any place within any such zone: provided, that this regulation shall not apply to the giving or serving in a private home to members of the family or bona fide guests other than officers or members of the naval forces, such liquors as may be on hand in such private home on the date of the taking effect of this regulation viz: the 2nd of April, 1918: provided also that this regulation shall not apply to the sale or gift of such liquor by registered pharmacists to licensed physicians or medical officers of the United States for medical purposes or the transmitting of such liquor to registered pharmacists, licensed physicians or medical officers of the United States for use as aforesaid.

In answer to a letter referred to Secretary Daniels by Captain Moffett of Great Lakes, Mr. Daniels says: "In drafting such regulations it is my intention that no intoxicants should be carried into the 'dry zones' and it is my opinion that after said date it is unlawful to ship, transmit, carry or transport intoxicants into the dry zones by common carrier or any means whatever."

The enforcement of this law is in the hands of the Federal authorities and recently Judge Landis sentenced a man in Highwood to a fine of \$200 and costs and nine months in jail for having four quarts and 14 pints of whisky and two cases of beer on his premises.

TAKE CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS WHEREVER GIVEN

New Ruling Enables Applicant to Enter Competition at Place of Residence

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on March 27, 1918, the President approved a joint resolution of Congress suspending, during the period of the present war, the operation of the provision of law which required applicants for civil service examinations to be examined in the State or Territory in which they reside. During the period of war, therefore, applicants for any examination held by the Commission may be examined at any place at which the examination is held, regardless of their place of residence. An act of July 2, 1909, required examinations to be taken in the State of residence. While this provision is suspended for the period of the war, it is still required that only those who have been actually domiciled in the State or Territory in which they reside for at least one year previous to the examination may become eligible for permanent appointment to the apportioned departmental service in Washington, D. C.

The Commission expects this change to make it easier to obtain applicants for positions in Washington. Competent stenographers, typists, and bookkeepers are in great demand. Examinations for these positions are held weekly throughout the country. Representatives of the Civil Service Commission at the post offices in all cities are furnishing detailed information and application blanks.
