### HOTEL FOR GREAT LAKES

#### County Coal Dealers Elect Officers, Winnetka Police Get New Motorcycles, Railroad to be Sold

#### Hotel for Great Lakes

A hotel, capable of accommodating about 200 officers and guests of the Naval Training Station, will be established by the Navy Relief Society, in the near future. This announcement was made Friday by Assistant Paymaster J. D. Doyle.

The hotel building will be constructed of the three houses at the north end of Camp Paul Jones on the property recently acquired by the government. The idea was originated by Captain Moffett and will be a great inducement for the officers to remain on the station.

The increased cost of servant hire makes the service problem a difficult proposition. As a result of this 100 Chinese boys will be enrolled for mess attendants at the hotel and cafeteria. This will release the bluejackets in the cafeteria.

Plans are already begun by the Public Works office for the construction of the hotel building and work will be started within a week. It is expected to have the hotel completed by June 1.

The hotel will be known as the Navy Relief Hotel, and will be run under the direction of Mr. Doyle. It will be convenient for visitors who come to the Station and wish to remain over night.

#### County Coal Dealers Meet

Lake county coal dealers met at the Waukegan Chamber of Commerce Friday and re-elected their officers of last year, as follows:

G. L. Blanchard, president; T. M. Clarke, Highland Park, V-president; David T. Webb, secretary and treasurer. The dealers discussed the coal situation, but confessed themselves as much in the dark as is the public, regarding supply, prices or conditions. They were pessimistic regarding the anthracite situation and all are laying in early stocks of bituminous. The first anthracite is expected about May 1st.

#### Wauconda Railroad to be Sold May 15

Receiver R. L. Peck of the Palatine, Lake Zurich and Wauconda R. R., has obtained an order from the court authorizing him to advertise the road for sale. Said sale will take place at the Palatine depot, May 15. The minimum price at which the road can be sold is \$100,000. Ten per cent must be cash, the balance payable when deed is conferred. The interests who have been seeking to obtain possession of the road from the receiver through the court, filed their appeal bond from the recent adverse court decision the first of last week, but the bond was thrown out. Mr. Peck obtained the above order of sale immediately afterwards.

## NEWS OF SOLDIER'S DEATH IS FALSE

### Mr. C. C. Buell Receives Wire From Adj. Gen. McCain That Son is Still Alive

On Tuesday morning many citizens were shocked to hear the report of the death of Corporal Charles C. Buell, Jr. of Battery F, 149th F. A. Yesterday morning the Press got in touch with Mr. C. C. Buell the father of the boy. He was happy to state that on Tuesday evening he received a telegram from Adj. Gen. McCain that there was no record of Corporal Buell of that unit.

The casualty list of Monday had carried the name of Corporal Charles J. Buell Jr., unit not designated, as having died of unknown causes. Attorney Buell is convinced that his son is still alive and has cabled to him. The appearance of the name of Corporal Charles J. Buell, Jr. is still unexplained.

Corporal Buell enlisted in the 149th F. A. when it was stationed at Fort Sheridan. He was a senior of the Illinois University and has a brother, Temple Hoyne Buell who is on the firing line with the 101st Trench Mortars.

April 18, 1918.

### To Our Highland Park Boys In the Service of "Uncle Sam"

Just give us time enough to get the genius of our people to work and we will solve the problem. This is what we are going to do with this great job and we know that you will do your part in the service. We "stay-at-homes" are trying to do our part and you can rely upon our doing it.

Please do not feel under any obligations to answer this letter. You are very busy men, but we just wanted you to know that you are not forgotten from this end of the line.

The Right Reverend Charles P. Anderson, Episcopal Bishop of Chicago, will deliver a patriotic address relating the past glories of the State to the Great War in which thousands of her sons are enlisted today.

Under the direction of Mr. John Alden Carpenter a trained chorus will give the famous Battle Songs of the Civil War era.

The foyer of the hall will be made into a Museum with exhibits covering the history of Illinois from the Indian days down to the present. A reception will be held here following the meeting.

## LAW AND ORDER LEAGUE TO HOLD BIG RALLY

### F. D. EVERETT TO PRESIDE

#### To Urge Highland Park to Share Responsibility of Maintaining Clean Condition for Army and Navy

The Lake County Law and Order League patriotic demonstration at the Presbyterian church Friday night is now assured of a great success. The Waukegan Pipe and Drum Corps composed of prominent business men of that city will assist in the program.

The U. S. army and navy will be represented and the First Air Cadet Corps of the high school will march to the church. The singing will be under the efficient leadership of Mr. Carl Booth.

The procession will form at the Northwestern station, and march along Laurel Ave. to the church.

Mayor Hastings, Rev. Frank Pitt, Professor Hawley and T. R. Quayle, secretary of the League will deliver addresses. A short address will be delivered by Chaplain W. P. Williams of the Naval Station.

The speech of the evening will be delivered by Lieutenant Crozier, the soldier orator of the Canadian army. Mr. F. D. Everett will preside.

The object of the meeting is to inspire us to share the responsibilities of the government in securing absolutely clean conditions for the 6000 soldiers and the 50,000 jacksies who will be our guests during the coming summer. The U. S. Government asks the officials of cities and villages to enforce the government proclamations, concerning liquor and vice near military posts and naval stations. Let there be a great outpouring of citizens on Friday night.

Mr. Daniels the secretary of the navy has both recognized and thanked the League for its work.

The United States Brewers Association is sending out from New York City under date of April 13, 1918 to all parts of the United States, the following circular to liquor dealers:

"Your attention is called to the recent order of the Secretary of the Navy prohibiting any further transportation or delivery within the five-mile zone circumjacent to certain naval stations, of any alcoholic beverages, even if intended for private consumption."

## 15-CENT MILK WILL SAVE DAIRY HERDS

### PRODUCERS GET 5.2 CENTS

#### Russell Postmaster Says Hundreds of Dairy Cows are Being Shipped to Stock Yards from Lake County

That 15-cent milk, making it possible for the producer to get 5 1/2 cents per quart for milk, is all that will stay the slaughter of Lake county herds, is the statement of James A. Reeves, postmaster at Russell, where hundreds of dairy cows already have been shipped to the stockyards and where additional carloads of cows are being shipped out every week, sometimes daily. It was only a few days ago that John Strang, a cattle buyer at Russell, shipped 250 dairy cows to the stockyards at Chicago.

"Carloads of cows are being shipped away constantly," Mr. Reeves states. "It is deplorable but it cannot be helped under the existing conditions. The farmers cannot be blamed for getting out of the milk business when required to sell milk at the prices fixed for the Chicago district which includes all of Lake county."

"Under the present schedule the producers in Lake county are getting but 5.2 cents per quart. It is absolutely impossible to produce milk for this price."

"In the Boston district the farmers are receiving 8 1/2 cents per quart for milk. It is retailed at 15 cents. Fifteen cents per quart for milk is not high when the food value is considered."

## TO COMPLETE WISCONSIN END OF SHERIDAN ROAD FIRE DEPARTMENT STILL BUSY ANSWERING CALLS

### Work on Portion of Road North of State Line Past Kenosha to Begin at Once Axt Home on Clark St. is Saved From Loss Thursday Evening Last

The improvement of the Sheridan Road from the Illinois state line to the line ten miles north of the city of Racine, where the road joins with the Milwaukee county portion of the road has been approved by the federal road commission and the work is to proceed. This fact is told in letters received from Frank A. Cannon, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Good Roads association, says the Kenosha News.

Acting under federal orders the letting of contracts for the construction of the road will start at Racine on Tuesday when the contracts will be let for the stretch of the road in Racine county which adjoins the Milwaukee county line. There will be about three and a half miles of road to be constructed at this point.

## WARRANTS OUT FOR SIX MILK PRODUCERS

### Charged With Selling Watered Milk. Penalties Range from \$15 to \$100 Fines

Six Lake County milk producers face arrest on a charge of having sold watered milk, that is milk containing less than 8 1/2 per cent of solids as required by law. Warrants for their arrest were sworn out Tuesday afternoon by Inspector Lestrom of the Agricultural department of the state government, acting in conjunction with the attorney general. State's Attorney Welch will assist in the prosecutions. The names of the defendants are: J. G. Poulton—Lake Villa, Howard and Maurice Murrill—Grayslake, Frank Bauerschmidt—Area, Edward Wagner—Grayslake, Anton Salami—Grayslake, Fred Wagner—Grayslake.

The cases have been set for trial April 26 at 10 a. m. sharp. Penalties for violations of this nature range from \$15 to \$100.
