DEATHS

**Mrs. John Grenville Mott**

Mrs. John Grenville Mott, maiden name Rue Winterbotham, daughter of John Humphrey Winterbotham and Mahala Rosecrans Winterbotham who died April 5th, was born in 1845 in Frederickton, Ohio. When she was seven years old, the family moved to Fort Madison, Iowa, and she was sent to school at Denmark, Ia., until the time of the Civil War. In 1868 they removed to Michigan City, Indiana, where she was married, in 1874, to Mr. John Grenville Mott. They lived at Michigan City for thirty years, during which time Mrs. Mott was extremely active in all civic work; she established the Needlework Guild and was very instrumental in establishing the Public Library.

About 1904 Mr. and Mrs. Mott came to Chicago and lived in the city until 1909, when they built their present residence at Highland Park, where she resided until her death.

Mrs. Mott was one of the oldest members of the Antiquarian and Fortnightly Clubs of Chicago, and was also a member of the Garden and Ossoli Clubs of Highland Park; she was an active personal force in the life of the town up to this winter.

Mrs. Mott was not well this winter and went south to Orlando, Florida. There she was taken ill, but after about two weeks was somewhat better and started to return home; she suffered a relapse, however, and died upon arrival in Chicago.

Mrs. Mary May, wife of Mr. Joseph May of Green Bay Road, passed away last Thursday at the age of twenty-seven years, after an illness of several months duration. Funeral services were held Saturday morning at ten o'clock at the Immaculate Conception Church with Dr. O'Neill officiating.
