Mrs. John Grenville Mott, maider name Rue Winterbotham, daughter Humphrey Winterbotham and Mahala Rosecrans Winterbotham who died April 5th, was born in 1845 in Frederickton, Ohio, When she was seven years old, the family moved to Fort Madison, Iowa, and she was sent to school at Denmark, Ia., until the time of the Civil War. In 1868 they removed to Michigan City, Indiana, where she was married, in 1874, to Mr. John Grenville Mott. They lived at Michigan City for thirty years, during which time Mrs. Mott was extreemly active in all civic work; she established the Needlework Guild and was very instrumental in establishing the Public Library.
