But our boys at the front have seen and realized this war as we have not yet done. Their letters, in many respects are similar. In almost every case the philosophy of these lads of twenty has leaped the gradual stages of twenty years' development and they write their mothers with the minds of forty. In the letter of J. C. McMullen, twenty-two years old, he tells why he would rather be "over there" than any where else in the world and why he expects to remain: "It is patriotism, yet it is more than patriotism; it is pride yet it is more than pride.
