ORDINANCE TO INCREASE TAX RATE IS APPROVED

Mr. E. P. Spellman, Mr. Oscar Swan and Mr. Jacob Fredline Elected at Highland Today

The Aldermanic election, which was held on Tuesday at Highland resulted in the following named men being elected:

First ward, Mr. E. P. Spellman, on the Peoples Ticket. Second ward, Mr. Oscar Swan, on the Peoples Party Ticket won over Mr. Thomas E. Welsh and in the Third ward, Mr. Jacob Fredline was elected on the Peoples Party Ticket.

A vote of 83 for and 81 against, the adoption of the provision of an ordinance to increase the rate of taxation in the City of Highland, from one and two-tenths per cent to two per cent upon the aggregate assessed valuation of all the property within said City, subject to taxation, as the same may be equated for the current year, was carried which carried the proposition.

Highland in its progressive way is the first city to attempt to adopt the new act and is to be congratulated upon the way in which the election turned out. They are by increasing the taxes in lieu of a bond issue, they will save the interest that would accrue on the bonds, the printing, publication and floating the bonds on the market, which could hardly be expected to sell at par—hence another loss. The proposition seems a good one. Highland now has most of its streets paved, but have discontinued further improvement during the period of the World's Great War.
