## FIRST UNITED EVAN.

Corner of Green Bay Road and Laurel Ave. C. G. Unangst, pastor.

Last Sunday morning Rev. Unangst spoke on the subject "The Macedonian Call". At the close of his sermon, as a fitting illustration, he read a letter from Dr. C. Newton Dubbs, superintendent of our mission in China. Dr. Dubbs told of a young Chinaman who had been called into the ministry and who promised to be very valuable in spreading the gospel among his own people. An education along this line will be necessary and will mean expenses which he himself is unable to meet. The church accepted this letter as a call and are voluntarily undertaking to meet the obligations of a seminary course for this young Chinese preacher.

Dr. H. H. Thorne of Chicago, the new presiding elder, is to be in Highland Park on Friday and will preach in the church at 7:45 in the evening. After this service a meeting of the quarterly conference will be held.

On Sunday (April 28th) Dr. Thorne will preach both morning and evening (10:45 a. m. and 7:45 p. m.) On these occasions he will also administer the Lord's Supper.

Bible School meets at 9:30 a. m. The lesson for Sunday is "Jesus Rebukes Selfishness." Intemperance lesson.

The topic for K. L. C. E. discussion is to be "The Power of the Cross in City Slums" in charge of the Missionary Committee at the usual hour, 6:45 p. m.

Mid-week prayer meeting at the church on Wednesday evenings at 7:45 o'clock.

## COLLEGE WOMEN ENTER VASSAR TRAINING CAMP

### HOSPITALS TO CO-OPERATE

Course of Study to Include All Subjects in High Class Training Schools. Camp to Open June 24th

The college women of Illinois are asked to join the "College Women's Plattsburg," the Training Camp for nurses to be held this summer at Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, N. Y. under the auspices of the Red Cross and the Council of National Defense. The training Camp is a preparation for regular nursing practice to turn out the "R. N." or registered nurse to serve under the Red Cross in the present national emergency. Even if the war should cease tomorrow the opportunities for reconstruction work, public health nursing and social service at home are unlimited.

Miss Gladys M. Spencer of Wade Street, a graduate of Vassar College, class '14, has formally registered with the Vassar Alumnae Recruiting Committee, 106 East 52nd St. New York city.

The committee states great interest has been awakened among the college girls and it is hoped that many will consider becoming candidates for the camp. Inquiries have been pouring in from college women in all parts of the country. All women who have graduated in the last ten years from standard universities and colleges including the 1916 graduates are eligible to enter the Training Camp which opens June 24 and lasts three months. Upon finishing the course the college nurses will go into the best hospitals of the country where they will complete their training with two years practical work. The entire Vassar plant has been turned over to the government by the trustees for grounding college women in the theory of nursing.

The Training Camp at Vassar is not a "short cut" to nursing service, but a gateway through which earnest women may enter upon a career of useful service. Nursing is a difficult art and can be acquired only by considerable body of scientific knowledge. The course of study at the Training Camp, therefore, will include all subjects taught at the highest class training schools, such as anatomy, physiology, hygiene, bacteriology materia medica, chemistry, psychology, nutrition and dietetics and social economies. The course was arranged by the Nursing Committee of the Council of National Defense. Leading specialists in the nursing and professions will serve on the faculty, which includes heads of departments from Yale, Harvard, John Hopkins, Columbia University, New York University, and Carnegie Institute.

Since the Red Cross has given \$75,000 to maintain the Camp, the student fee will be small, about \$95, it is announced. This will include registration, tuition, board, room and laundry for the entire term. Leading hospitals of the country have already applied for the student nurses, who upon finishing the Vassar course, will step immediately into hospital service and may, when the call comes, thus release more experienced nurses for the front.
