Red Cross Shop

The surgical dressing department of the Red Cross stood to, carried on, and eventually went over the top this month with its quota of 40,000 front line dressings, although it meant staying after hours on Tuesday to do it. But what is staying after hours with such a good sort of folk for fellow workers, and such a gallant and determined Captain in command! Besides completing its own quota, ahead of time, the Highwood Shop made 900 drains which went to Highland Park's credit. A portion of Highland Park's quota transferred to the Ravinia Shop, which had also finished its quota, but this was sent in direct from there.

The various groups of workers at the Y. W. C. A. contributed 300 muslin bandages, and altogether the month's work came to a satisfactory completion. Already we have turned our faces towards this month's assignment which includes more tampons, applicators, and pads.

The garment department feels the need of workers. It is a loyal but far too small a group that turn out such perfect work each week, last week sending 35 finished garments on to headquarters.

Food Conservation

It has come at last! the satisfactory bread recipe without wheat flour. We secured it for you through Mrs. Lloyd Bergen, who confided that it was the result of experimentation on the part of Miss Annie Haughey, who, as a member of that patriotic household, has had an excellent opportunity to work to a highly satisfactory war bread. Here it is:

1 tbsp. salt, 1 tbsp. sugar, 1 pt. scalded milk 1 tablespoon lard 1 pt. cold water, 1 yeast cake, dissolved in one half cup warm water, 2 qt. rye flour and 1 pt. rice flour.
Mix in order given. Allow it to rise only once. Do not knead, but cut in three loaves, mold, and after rising to double the size, bake for 45 minutes. Here's luck to it and you.
