isfactory war bread. Here it is: 1 tbsp salt, 1 tbsp sugar, 1 scalded milk 1 tablespoon lard 1 pt cold water, I yeast cake, dissolved in one half cup warm water, 2 qtf rye flour and 1 pt. rice flour.

Mix in order given. Allow rise only once. Do not knead, but cut in three loaves, mold, and after, rising to double the size, bake for 45 minutes. Here's luck to
