News of Safety of Local Man, Abroad  
Oronsa Reaches Friends and Relatives Here

News reached Highland Park's on Monday that Mr. Arthur Hoyt Bogue, who had sailed recently on the Orons with a number of Y. M. C. A. workers had been rescued when the boat was torpedoed and was in safety. His many friends here, and especially those at the Moraine, where he had made his home, and who wired him a congratulatory message, were relieved to have had this message. Mr. Bogue who is physically unfit for military duty enlisted in the Y. M. C. A. and sailed on April 12th. At the time of the disaster Mr. Bogue, at the risk of his own life, rescued people from the torpedoed ship.

The workers will, in all probability proceed on their journey across the waters and are determined to show Autocracy that they mean business. Mr. Bogue is a brother of Mrs. Frank G. Gardner.
