**HOME SERVICE, A RED CROSS ACTIVITY**  
**LARGE FIELD IS OFFERED**  
 Desperate Need for Volunteer Workers Among the Many Destitute Families

Adequate words of praise can never be written to express the great humanitarian achievements of the Red Cross in Chicago, through its Home Service Station. When one realizes that it is only through the Red Cross that the families of a majority of our fighting men are sustained, something of the nature of the vast duties undertaken by the Home Service Station can be understood. Many books could be written on the subject, material for sermons and lectures unlimited might be found here, all dealing with the manifestations of that spirit of brotherly love which is synonymous with the words "Red Cross." Only after this war has long been buried in the past, however, will much of the evidence become fluid for history's pen. Unbroken secrecy in regard to the sensitive facts in the various "cases" is a fundamental principle of the Home Service work. The reasons for this are, of course, obvious.

With a field so large, and hourly growing larger as the war progresses, it is necessary to employ hundreds of volunteer workers, acting in the capacity of friendly visitors, investigators, etc. These workers are not easy to obtain.

Mrs. Katharine Briggs, Director of the Section, is a heroic figure whose labors in behalf of the enlisted men's families have been unremitting since an early period after America entered the war. Well known as a social service worker before she came with the Red Cross, Mrs. Briggs has given to that body, the benefit of her long experience as executive head of numerous philanthropic organizations.

There is a desperate need for more volunteers to help stem the tide of unhappy and destitute families who are pouring into the Red Cross gates. All of these little groups have lost their sole source of existence, the family breadwinner, who has sacrificed not only himself, but his dearest ones upon the patriotic altar.

What can the Red Cross do with these children of pain—how can it intelligently take charge of their affairs while the man of the house is away, unless the necessary workers come forth?

To qualify for Home Service work, the applicant must possess an abounding love of humanity, sympathy and tact in rare degree, as well as an education of no mean sort. It should be understood that all types of minds will be dealt with in the work, and such delicate matters as natural pride of family independence and personal choice must not be interfered with.

On the other hand, the work is fascinating and brings unusually rich rewards to the lover of human nature. There is no thrill on earth comparable to the one which comes from observing the genuine gratitude of a soul snatched from poverty's fangs.

Through such service in caring for the wants of families left behind by the nation's fighting men, the Home Service volunteer may render to the Government inestimable help and may aid enormously in the prosecution of the war.
