This message, written on a receipt for garments turned into headquarters warmed the hearts of the workers in the garment department as well it might. Incidentally it is not only the garment department that has the reputation of handing in perfect work. As we cannot follow you to other camps, we should like to hear from you if you are transferred. Tell us if you need recreation centers in your new location, if you find something better than our Center there, write and tell us of improvements we could add. When you are sent to France, drop us a line, for we are always interested in you, and a card from "over there" will inspire the boys who are taking your place here. Self addressed post cards will be given you, upon application to the attendant at the Center.

If you want news from Highland Park and will say so, we will write you, too.

Don't forget when you are in the front line that the heart of the Army and Navy Center is with you and that the great Citizen Army of America is backing you up.
