Work Being Done by Interned Alien Enemies Under Direction of Mr. O. S. Gooch

Fort Sheridan is to have a 6-acre war garden located just west of the guard house and north of the C. N. S. & M. power house. The work is being done by the interned alien enemies under the direction of Mr. O. S. Gooch.
They expect to raise enough garden truck to supply the entire garrison.

Lake County in Third Place
To the county of Lake goes the honor of ranking third among the 102 counties of the state in the percentage of Liberty Bond sales in the campaign which closed a few days ago. But two counties in the state made a better record and their lead over Lake county was small.
George B. Robinson, assistant director of sales for Illinois, has written a letter to H. C. Burnett, chairman of the campaign in Lake County in which he offers congratulations upon the fine showing made.
He expresses himself forcefully in the following extract from the letter: "Three cheers for Lake county!"
"Last night's report shows \$2,312,000, and in addition we have affidavits from the Highland Park committee showing subscriptions through Chicago banks of \$353,000. The total is \$2,665,000 or 188 per cent of your minimum quota. Stephenson and Stark counties lead the state with approximately 200 per cent, and Lake county at the present time is third. "Please except our most cordial congratulations on this splendid result."

RAVINIA SCHOOL
Last Friday afternoon the children of the seventh and eighth grade enjoyed a trip by auto along the North Shore thru Chicago to the University of Chicago where they heard an illustrated lecture on "City Planning" by Prof. Bedford. This trip was an outgrowth of a study of a transportation system of the city. Mr. Lawrence Hueck accompanied the class and with his aid the children noted important points in the main route, the laying out of parks, roads and resident districts along the way.
As an outgrowth of the mothers meeting held last Wednesday the upper grades have organized an industrial army for the purpose of earning money to buy thrift stamps. Each child has registered the hours, tools and the kind of work in which he is experienced with the school employment agency in which Mrs. Chase is in charge. In order to keep the work on a business basis a report of the quality and completeness of the work done by each child is requested from his employer. This record is to be filed in the card catalogue of the agency as a help in the proper placing of young workers.
An enthusiastic campaign for the selling of thrift stamps started with the children of Ravinia this week. They hope soon to reach the 100% grade in each room.
The children have also decided to adopt at least one French orphan and earn the money for this purpose themselves.


