Y. W. C. A. NEWS

A request has come from those interested that more publicity be given the activities of the Y. W. C. A. here in Highland Park in order that the work being done may become known to all. The Press is the only medium of communication between those promoting the many lines of work and the public at large.

In as much as the maintenance of the Association depends largely upon private subscriptions, the memberships bring but a small part of the income, there is no doubt but that that there would be many more subscribers if it were possible to reach the heart of more people, the many calls that are being met so generously at the present moment shows the generosity of the people when once interest is aroused.

The financial side of this question is only secondary in the effort to show what is being accomplished in the local Association. Primarily the object of any Y. W. C. A. is to develop the girl along religious, social, physical and educational lines. But this year it seems as though each department has taken on a new meaning, broadening and developing the original and the purpose of the association. "To make us grow strong true and unselfish, with a genuine appreciation of everything good and beautiful around, to be truly friendly, to serve the community to share with others the joy of Christ himself"—means more than it ever did before. If it were only possible in this article to give details of service the Y. W. C. A. are called upon to render every day a more comprehensive view would be given of the need and the place it fills in the community. But for personal reasons this more intimate information must not be divulged. Suffice it to say that when women or girls are stranded in the town, ill and alone, friendless or lost, they are sent to the Association where efforts are made to locate friends or relatives, and where an interest is shown in their plight that soon wins their confidence. Since last June an enormous amount of this work has been carried on by the Association, both day and night for the women connected more or less remotely with the Fort and Great Lakes men.

From now on a separate phase of the work will be written each week showing the value of the organization as a community factor.

There will be a Mother's club meeting Tuesday June 6th which closes the club for the summer. An excellent program has been provided. A cordial invitation is extended to all women who are interested.

The next Red Cross meeting will be held Thursday evening, June 7th, when the new quota of work will be in.

Similar arrangements have been made for messages from members of the expeditionary forces in England and France.
