 The following letter has been turned over to us for publication. It was written by Lieutenant Lester Levin who won his commission at the second officers' Training Camp Fort Sheridan.  
 Somewhere in France Sunday May 5th 1918  
 Dearest Mother and Dad:  
 Enclosed is a program of the enlisted men's Minstrels to be given on the 9th, so you see we have recreation as well as work. We are going to have one great show. The Commanding General of the Tank Corps and his Staff has sent word that they would be there to see the show. I have been working hard to make it a success. We expect about 1000 people to attend the show and the Y. M. C. A. is busy enlarging their hut so that it will have ample seating capacity for that night, and yours truly will be down in front waving the little baton. I will have rehearsal all day as it is Sunday, and will write more in a few days with lots of love from your boy,

 The program included many American songs, which we know must have been an immediate success. Lieut. Levin's name was on the program as stage director.
