### BISHOP SEAGER TO SPEAK HERE SUNDAY

**Ebenezer Evangelical Church Bids All Who Desire to Hear Message of Prominent Educator**

Bishop Lawrence H. Seager will preach at the Ebenezer Evangelical Church at 7:45 Sunday evening. The church considers the coming of Bishop Seager an exceptional privilege.

He is the youngest of the Bishops of the Evangelical Association. Prior to his election to the episcopacy, in 1915, he distinguished himself by his ability both as an editor of religious literature, and as an educator. He served with marked success for a number of years as President of Northwestern College, at Naperville, Ill.

His typical Americanism, his strong personality, his eloquence as a public speaker and rich experience as a Christian worker give him a prominent place among religious leaders of the day, and should make his coming to Highland Park an occasion of unusual significance to the community.

Ebenezer Church takes great pleasure in making this announcement, and in inviting the friends of the congregation to share with them in the benefits of this episcopal visit. There will be special singing by a quartette from the Naval Training Station.

### NEW RED CROSS RULING AFFECTS LOCAL SHOP

**Order to Close Shop Part of Each Day Is Observed Here, Beginning Next Week**

Orders from Chicago headquarters to the local Red Cross shop reveals a remarkably low quota for the month of June. For this reason the shop will be open as follows, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday from 9 to 1 p. m. and on Thursday and Friday from 1 to 4 p. m.

This ruling takes place next week. Those in charge do not know why the order is issued, but hopes that all workers will observe it without questioning. The order holds good until further notice.

### SUN TO BE PARTLY ECLIPSED ON SATURDAY

**Moon, to Cover Part of Surface, Phenomena Takes Place Here Five Thirty-seven**

On June 8th there will be an eclipse of the sun. In the afternoon the moon will pass between the earth and the sun, and will cast its shadow over the greater part of North America. The sun will appear partly eclipsed in every portion of the United States, but only in a narrow zone will be total. The shadow cone on June 8th will

first touch the earth at sunrise in the Pacific Ocean not far south of Japan. Thence it will sweep eastward entering the United States in southwestern Washington at 2:55 p. m. Pacific standard time. It will then be traveling at a speed of 33 miles a minute. Striking southeast, it will cross the Mississippi river at 5:37 p. m. central time, reach the coast of Florida at 6:42 p. m. eastern time, and leave the earth after reaching the vicinity of the Bahamas at sunset. The actual time required for the journey across the United States will be 47 minutes. The coming eclipse will be observed by scientists from all the leading observatories. People from this locality will go to Denver where the Chamberlin Observatory is situated right in the path of totality. ### CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION, JUNE 22ND

**Competition for Clerk and Carrier to be Held at Local Post Office. Address Arvid Magnusson**

An examination for clerk and carrier will be held at the post office in this city on June 22, 1918. Age limit, 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination.

Married women will not be admitted to the examination. This prohibition, however, does not apply to women who are divorced but they are eligible for appointment only as clerks.

Applicants must be physically sound, and male applicants must be not less than 5 feet 4 inches in height in bare feet, and weigh not less than 125 pounds without overcoat or hat.
