MEMORIAL DAY SERVICE AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Chaplain Bernard Iddings Bell of Great Lakes Spoke on "The Purifying of America"

Last Thursday, Memorial Day, was observed throughout the land as a day of humiliation and prayer to Almighty God, a day of fasting and of petition. The President asked our citizens to assemble in their places of worship and there implore God to forgive the nation its sins, and to help and guide it in its time of trial.

Several congregations joined in the evening in a community service, which was held in the auditorium of the Presbyterian Church, the Pastor the Rev. Frank Pitt, presiding.

After the opening hymn, "O God, our Help in Ages Past", the penitential sentences, which struck the keynote of the whole service, were read, and Psalm 68, the great battle hymn of the ancient Hebrews, and of the middle ages was read responsively. The President's proclamation was then read, followed by the hymn, "Soldiers of Christ Arise, and Put Your Armour On". Prayers appropriate to the occasion were offered by Dr. Wolcott, and "The Battle Hymn

of the Republic" followed. The address was delivered by the Rev. Bernard Iddings Bell, Voluntary Chaplain of Great Lakes Naval Training Station. His subject was "The Purifying of America".

"Of what value will be the sacrifice of the lives of our brave boys," said Chaplain Bell, "unless we here at home keep clean the country they are defending? Not only must we keep it clean, but we must make it pure where now it is impure, and we must revolutionize our civilization so that when the boys come back they will find that their sacrifice and suffering has been worth while. For one thing, our industrial problems cry out for solution—and unless we solve them now, men who have faced death to defend our institutions, will face death again to improve them and to socialize them."

"These are not dark days" he said. "The dark days were those before the war. These are days full of hope and promise. A stagnant civilization preceded this war, and has been awakened to its sins by the war."

"There stands one among us who is ever speaking to us of all these things. He moves among us quietly protesting against our sins, and pointing to that better way of life which He came to tell us about."

"I have died for you" He is saying. "These men are dying for you" what are you doing?"

A most impressive procession of the flags of the allies followed the address. The Belgian National air was played, and a red cross girl, bearing the Belgian flag, marched in, accompanied by two boy scouts as color guards. Likewise in succession the Italian flag, the French British and lastly, the American flag came in. Then a verse of America was sung. Dr. Wolcott pronounced the benediction.

TO LEAVE FOR FRANCE IN Y. M. C. A. INTEREST
