Highland Park Must Meet Her Quota. Give Your Postmaster Your Stamp Trade. All purchasers of War Savings Stamps should read the following facts concerning the sale and purchase of these stamps. 1. War Savings Stamps purchased in Cook County do not go to the credit of Lake County or Highland Park. 2. The Highland Park postmaster is being rated by the department for the amount of Stamps of which he disposes. 3. Highland Park stands third in the list of Lake County towns in the sales of War Savings Stamps per capita, with Lake Zurich and Lake Villa ahead of her. With a few more maximum subscribers she could be first. 4. The Government has set a schedule of 26 per cent of the cost of the war to be paid by these Stamps. 5. Many families of the county have taken the maximum amount for not only the head of the house but also for the wife and each of the children, such as Mr. and Mrs. Brewerton of Libertyville, and Mr. and Mrs. John Tuttle, and Mr. and Mrs. Tynes of Highland Park. 6. Unless these maximum amounts are taken by the people who can subscribe neither Lake County nor Illinois will meet the schedule which is being met by other counties and other states. Dear Parents and Sister: Everything is in very good condition so far, and we have about two more days before we see land. We have been at sea for about nine days now and no land in sight yet. We hope it will not be long before we do, however. On the ship we get only two meals a day, one at 9:30 a. m. and the other at 3:00 p. m. but these two make up for the three we had back there in camp. Every night we have a show by some of the boys on board ship and they are very good indeed. There are two more ships with us and these are also loaded with troops. There are 15,000 troops on board the three ships. We have met two sailors on board the ship whom we were acquainted with. One was a Highland Park boy who drove the Exmoor bus and also worked at Leuer Bros. and McPherson's garages. The other boy was a Glencoe boy. We are a very long way from home so do not forget to write often. Instead of getting closer to our home we are getting closer to your birth places. We hope some day, very soon to go marching thru it with Old Glory in the lead. Don't worry about us for it is for a cause, and if the Lord-wills it and helps us we may all come safely home again. FOURTH ANNUAL AUTO DERBY, SAT. JUNE 22nd

Louis Chevrolet, Darlo Resta, Barney Oldfield and Ralph Mulford to be at Speedway Park, Chicago. The greatest field of speed demons that has ever faced a starter will line up for the Fourth Annual Auto Derby, which will be run at Speedway Park, Chicago, on Saturday afternoon, June 22.
