Why Not Put Lake County in the Honor List Before that Date? Subscribe Now

It has been brought to our attention that there are 26 "honor" counties in the state of Illinois. These counties have already sold their quota of War Savings Stamps, or have obtained pledges sufficient to fill their proportion of the year's quota to date and are consequently going over the top.

We are also reminded that Lake County is NOT on the list.

The counties which are not in this list will be published throughout the state as "slacker" counties.

The only way that Lake County can go over the top is by getting it into the minds of the people who can afford to take the \$100 and \$100 limit, that it is necessary for them to use part of their money to purchase these Stamps, that it will not do to confine themselves to the bonds, as the Government has scheduled 20 per

cent as the proportion to be raised by the sale of War Savings Stamps toward the war expenses.

LAKE COUNTY GETS FEW FORDSON TRACTORS

Orders Can be Placed with Local Dealer, A. G. McPherson and Son, Farm Producers Only

At the urgent request of Governor Lowden and the State Council of Defense 750 Fordson tractors will be distributed in the state of Illinois by dealers of the Ford Motor Company. These tractors are sold at factory cost without profit to either dealer or factory and are to be sold only to farmers, who can show that use on their farms will materially increase production of food. Public demonstrations of this tractor at which, Henry Ford, Gov. Lowden, and members of the State Council of Defense will attend, will be held at the Luthhart Farm at Aurora, Ill. on June 24. Orders for the above tractor can be given at the office of A. G. McPherson and son in this city.
