On the other hand, our city has a Mayor and Board of Commissioners of whom we are justly proud. Voting in Highland Park is one of the few things which we do exremely well. As a vocation we take to it quite naturally. A fine disrimination between candidates, and for or against public questions is our distinctive characteristic. In this respect we differ perhaps from other municipalities of our size, so much so that we were not readily not favorably impressed by the arguments of men especially trained in the art of selling vacant land to would-be purchasers.

We would suggest that hereafter when a non-tesident comes to Highland Park with the hope of securing the approval of a majority of our voters, he have such a case as will appeal to the fairness of our public authorities, and that he work in fairness with the authorities to ha' end.
