illuminates the target and prevents the raiders from losing their way.

One Saturday morning we woke up to the sound of gun fire. The alarm was sounded for an air raid. Everyone was aghast at the audacity of the Boches who dared to raid Paris in broad day light. We saw two big flocks of French aeroplanes, flying in formation just like wild ducks or geese. They were seeking the enemy.

I went down town on the train about 10:00 a. m. The street cars had quit running. I found the streets jammed with people, most business places closed and even the subways stopped. Everyone had taken a holiday to see the air raid. During night raids, Parisians had always been more than willing to flee to cellars and bomb proof places, but this was new and different.

I was walking down the Boulevard des Italiens when about a block away, I heard an explosion. I reached the Place de la Republique in time to see them pick up the dead and wounded. Three French aeroplanes were circling round and round searching for the Boches that had dropped the bomb, but they were without success in locating them.

All Paris was puzzled. What new kind of airship had the Germans invented that could neither be heard nor seen in the broad daylight. At what lofty heights they must be flying!

That night there was another raid and the next morning the alarm sounded again, but the papers came out with the startling statement that the raid of the night before was not a raid at all, but a bombardment from guns 120 Km. away behind the German lines. For a time this seemed incredible, but it proved to be the truth.
