SMALL BLAZE ON FOURTH AT THE MORAINE HOTEL

Efficiency of Sprinkler System in Hotel and of City's Department in Prompt Response

There was a small fire at the Moraine Hotel on the morning of the fourth caused by a spark from a chimney igniting the roof over the kitchen wing.

The fire itself was soon extinguished by the hotel's own fire apparatus and resuled in a hole about two feet square through the roof with a few dollars damage from water, but two very important points were demonstrated by this fire. First; the hotel is throughly equipped with a sprinkler system installed three years ago. One of the sprinkler heads was just under the roof where the fire broke out, and sent in the alarm automatieally which was the first warning that there was anything wrong and which enabled the hotel fire company to promptly get the fire under control. Were it not for this alarm the fire would have reached large proportions until some one from the outside would see it and give the alarm.

Second: the affair proved the efficiency of our local fire department. An alarm was sent in and the company was on the grounds in four minutes ready for anything that might occur. Fortunately their services were not needed beyond covering the hole in the roof with tapaulin to prevent damage from rain, but the boys proved that they were on the job and the city is to be congratulated on having such a competent body of In Ravinia Park, Pavilion.
