**WEEKLY GOOD TIMES
 AWAIT TWO HUNDRED**

Alternately at Trinity and Presbyterian Parish Houses After Sunday Vespers, Supper and Sing

The entertainments for soldiers and sailors held alternately in the Presbyterian and Episcopal parish houses after the Sunday evening vesper services have been most successful and have been greatly appreciated by the men, from 150 to 200 of them having been present on each of the four Sunday evenings since the plan was put into operation. After the supper there is a sing, very ably led by Mr. Carl H. Booth which the men greatly enjoy and enter into most heartily, there have also been selections by local artists which have given great pleasure.

In order to provide this entertainment the ladies of the community have organized an executive committee of which Mrs. E. W. Spencer is chairman and of which Mrs. B. Gregory, Miss Charlotte Yoe, Mrs. Paul Smith, Mrs. Richmond Dean, Mrs. Frank Green and Miss Minch are members, other names will be added.

These ladies arrange the details of the suppers, food, hostesses, entertainment, services etc., apportioning the work to sub-committees and calling upon the ladies from the various congregations in town to assist, so that while the entertainments are held alternately in the two parish houses, these being the most available places, they are distinctly community and not parochial affairs, no one religious group assuming charge on any occasion.

This Ladies' Committee of Highland Park Churches is organized under the authority and in cooperation with the local Board of War Camp Community Service.

Provision is made each Sunday for two hundred men at the expense of about forty dollars. Contributions are asked from all who are willing to help, whether personally solicited or not, and should be sent to Mr. Carleton Moseley who has kindly consented to act as treasurer.

In addition to the Sunday evening entertainments and executive committee supervises a party which is held each Saturday evening in Trinity Parish House for soldiers and sailors. The chief feature of these parties is the playing of games under the direction of a trained play director. Two of these parties have been held and have been very successful, they are greatly enjoyed by the men who do not care to dance.

Miss Priscilla Carver and Miss Mary Clark have charge of these parties and are assisted by a large number of young ladies and by the chaplains appointed by the committee. Wholesome recreation under the proper direction is provided for the young men and is greatly appreciated by them.
