Animated by a Desire to do Reverence to
the Families of Our Boys in Service,
Highland Park has Designated
August 10th as the Day on
which to Honor Them

Sons-in-Service Day will be inaugurated with a parade composed of eight hundred men and a troop of Cavalry from Fort Sheridan, two drill companies from Great Lakes, First Battalion, First Regiment of the Illinois Reserve Militia, a Jackie Band, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Red Cross Organization.

The parade is scheduled to start at the City Hall at 2:30 o'clock p. m., at which time Governor Lowden will arrive from his home in Oregon.

The plans as outlined by Marshal Carr and his chief of staff, Captain Briton I. Budd provide for a line of march as follows:
Formation on Central avenue west of the tracks, proceeding south on First street to Laurel, east to St. Johns, north to Central and east to Lake Front. The order of march will be substantially as follows:
