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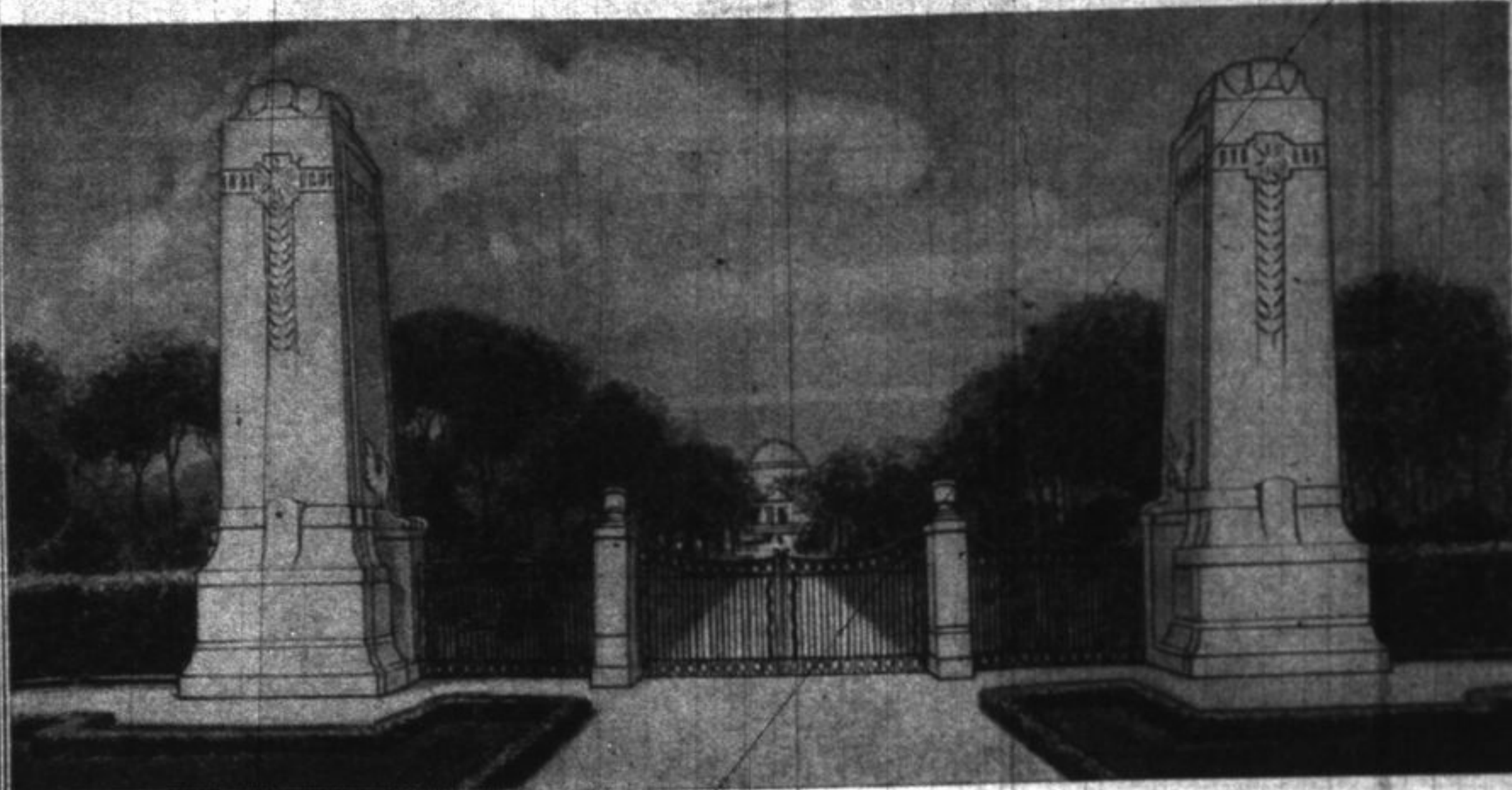

began to notice men and things—the question, "Will he succeed in life?" has been answered in the affirmative. Because I tell you, my friends, if that little fellow is now but twenty years old and is fighting for that flag and under that flag, he has already achieved a great success and has already lived a more rounded and complete life than an octogenarian in ordinary life.

It may be that the little fellow of twenty or twenty-five years ago took no particular interest in guns or ships or mechanical toys. It may be that he was a sort of dreamer. It is possible that there flowed in his gentle soul the love of all good things. It may even be that that boy was chided by his playmates with being effeminate because he did not like these other things, but if he was a dreamer, if he was gentle because his mind was constantly turning upon the gentler things of life, you may be sure that in this war he is in the very front of the battle, because that soul would know as it matured, that in this war which we are fighting today, all that every gentle soul in the past has achieved for the good of humanity, all the progress towards better, finer and more spiritual things that have grown out of the centuries this side of Calvary, are in peril, and therefore the gentle dreamer of twenty years ago is somewhere at the battle front—where I do not know—but he is there somewhere, whether it is in the Y. M. C. A. hut, whether it is with the Red Cross, or whether he is in the battle line, he is, you may be sure, in the place where he can render the greatest service to humanity. So, fathers and mothers of this beautiful North Shore, I want you to recollect, when your hearts ache sorely because of the absence of these boys, I want you to take this comfort to yourselves—that those boys have answered and answered "Yes" to the question which in their earliest years you asked. Because, as I said a moment ago, whatever the future may hold for them or how brief their lives may be on the battle front, they have already lived a fuller and a complete life and to a nobler purpose than any long-lived generation of men in ordinary times.

I am going today to read to you from some of the letters that soldiers have written to their homes. I have no doubt that many of you have received similar letters from your loved ones, if they have had time to write them, and I want to remind you of what Senator Parker has told you, I want you to know that our boys, and not only our boys but the English boys, the French boys, the Australian boys and the Italian boys are writing letters to their folks at home which they would have been incapable of writing a few brief years ago. This also ought to be a comfort to your hearts. They are developing finer qualities than come in ordinary times of peace. They are developing a finer religious sentiment and that is true not only of our boys, but of all France which was becoming very rapidly at least an Agnostic France, if not a Godless France. France, under the influence of this war, has turned to her God and there is a revival of genuine religion in France, such as has not been seen for 150 years. It may be that we, too, before this war, were becoming very careless in the finer things of life. It may be that we too were becoming a materialistic nation. It may be that we needed to pass through the fiery furnace of war, purging us of our dross and giving the spiritual forces within us a chance to come to life. That may be the Divine purpose of this awful war.

And if when you write your boy, you write as this mother did, telling him how well and happy you are and that everything goes well with you, that enables him more than anything else you can do, to meet the stern duties of a soldier. I wish that every mother in this broad land could read this letter from one of our own 149th Field Artillery. I want to ask you how many boys in the carefree, thoughtless generation past would have written letters like this? I want to ask you how many men, engrossed in their own self gratification, living for pleasure alone, have reached the end of the allotted three score years and ten, having in all their lives felt as much genuine ennobling emotion as these boys expressed who have put in but a few brief months at the battle front. I want to tell you that this boy from whose letter I have just read is right. It is something more than the blood of our country that is involved. It is pride, he says, and pride is a splendid quality for a soldier. But it is something more than pride. He sees what I wish all our people could see one-half as clearly and as well. He sees that beneath all the outward and seeming causes of this war, it is a

war of righteousness against Godlessness and injustice. That it is a war to preserve everything which all good men of all the past have struggled and died to give to the world. I wish all our people might know that if the ideas for which the Prussian autocracy stands today should triumph, it makes no difference what any of our ancestors in all our history have done for our beautiful land. I wish our people might know that if this war should go against us, every noble emotion which has taken form for the benefit of civilization and the world from before the day of Calvary down, will be lost, and the world for another thousand years at least, will plunge again as it did once before, into the dark ages and that the black midnight of that time will have reappeared. I wish our people might know as this boy knows, that it is something deeper than even the welfare of our own land, because in all the history of the world there never was a war with the issues so clear and so well defined as the issues of this war, fathers and mothers, in which your sons are fighting today. Don't forget that when this war is over and peace, a peace which will endure, shall have come again, these boys, most of whom will return through the greatest event of all the years and we who have remained at home will be then they who will be entitled to sympathy. That also ought to be some comfort to you. But if you will take to your hearts the spirit of this last letter, if you will learn what this youngster has learned, that all that we love, that all that is precious and dear, that all the nobler and more spiritual things which have blessed mankind, are involved in this war, you will thank God that you had a son or two sons or three sons to give to civilization.

Let me remind you of another thing. While our soldier has gained in the finer things, the Prussian soldier, the soldier of autocracy, has gone the other way, and let me tell you the significance of that. Germany began to teach a half century ago that the State can do no wrong, that it is above all moral law, that it is not bound by any of the ethical notions which control individuals in their relations with one another, and one of the consequences of that doctrine which even Germany did not perceive, is that a nation cannot deny the obligation of the moral law without all her people sinking down. Another consequence is that the newspapers of Germany are now complaining everywhere that crime has never been so prevalent in that country as it is today, and the increase is appalling indeed. You cannot educate your people to believe that the State is above the moral law and still have your people obey the moral law. You cannot serve a state that is unjust. You cannot serve a state that breaks its plighted word. You cannot serve a state that teaches that any cruelty is permissible if it only helps you achieve your end, without the people of your state becoming also false to their plighted word, without their becoming also cruel and relentless, without them also falling into the practices of crime. You cannot have an amoral state and a moral people. You cannot have a cruel state and a gentle, lovable people, and out of this war has grown the resolve that the state must observe in all its immensity, the moral law.

My friends, I have a few more brief words to say and then I shall close. I want to read from just one other letter which came to my attention, before I close. Excerpt from letter from young officer embodied sentiment that it would be better to be killed than to live to see the triumph of autocracy.

If this war should go against us, we of America just as well as those of Italy, Great Britain and France, would be under the iron heel of that military despotism which seeks to rule this universe and which has denied a God of a moral law. (Speaking of the letter.) That is the spirit. If we cannot bring justice and victory through democracy, this young officer says it is better to be killed than to survive the war, and as I look upon that service flag with its two hundred seventy-one stars, two of which have already turned to gold, I want to say that if this war should go against us, they none of all the people within your borders would have a right to peace or happiness, and if this war should go against us, happy, infinitely happy, are the two represented upon that flag by a golden star, compared with all of us who survive the war; infinitely better off than we if we do not win, for there is no spot beneath the heavens that will be fit for the residence of any independent, unspending and unspending man. Better, infinitely better, if we lose, that these wonderful prairies and forests of Illinois had never been reclaimed. Better, infinitely better that this country should fall back again to its primitive state and that this fair land of ours should become once more the home of the beasts of the field and the birds of the air, than that Illinois should survive to be

governed from Potsdam. Infinitely better, I say, that all our glorious history of more than one hundred and fifty years, had remained unwritten than that now it should be undone by the triumph of the forces of tyranny and darkness and brutal force.

And now, fathers and mothers of these two hundred seventy-one boys, I thank you. I thank you from the bottom of my heart that you are making this contribution to the cause of humanity, to the cause of civilization. I thank you. Illinois is celebrating the one hundredth year of its statehood and brilliant and splendid as are those hundred years, it is you—it is the fathers and mothers of the State of Illinois who are helping us in this hundredth anniversary, to be worthy of our mighty task. With all my heart I thank you again and again.
