**MR. CONRAD NAGEL
POSES AS LAURIE**

Guest of W. G. Ewing's Home Assisted in Filming of "Little Women" at Concord, Massachusetts.

Mr. Conrad Nagel, a rising American actor only twenty-one years of age, is a frequent visitor at the home of Judge W. G. Ewing of this city. Last winter he starred in "The Man Who Came Back" that had such a phenomenal run in Chicago. At present he is creating a new role in "Forever After" which was produced for the first time last month at Long Branch.

Just before enlisting in the Navy a few weeks ago at Pelham Bay, New York, Mr. Nagel assisted in a most interesting achievement, namely, the filming of "Little Women." This was done at the old Concord home of the Alcotts. He posed as "Laurie" in the dear old tale that is as welcome today as it ever was, and he tells of the pains taken by the movie artists to make the setting as truly historic as possible. Dresses which really and truly belonged to Jo and Amy were worn by the actresses who took their respective parts; old pieces of furniture were sent back to the homestead from different parts of the country to make the living room in the Alcott home approximately what it was when the "Little Women" actually lived there; artificial blossoms were purchased and pinned on the apple trees to make the orchard fit the description in the story.

"Forever After" has proved very successful and the company now has an engagement to produce it before President Wilson and other dignitaries at Washington, D. C. After this important engagement, Mr. Nagel expects to make a brief visit here before entering on his training for the Navy. His brother, Ewing Nagel, is also a successful comedian.

**COMMANDANT AT FORT
IS MADE A COLONEL**

Lieut. Col. Given Promotion—Is in Command of New Artillery At the Post.

Lieut. Col. L. A. I. Chapman, post commander at Fort Sheridan, and commander of the troops of the 112th cavalry stationed there, has been promoted to the rank of colonel. The new commission came Saturday following the order of the war department converting the cavalry outfit into the new 61st field artillery regiment.

Col. Chapman is a veteran of two Philippine campaigns, and has been in the service since 1898. He received his first commission and served as second and first lieutenant in the first cavalry, U. S. A. He was captain of the 2nd, 7th and 6th cavalry regiments, major of Philippine scouts and lieutenant colonel of infantry and cavalry in the national army. He succeeded Col. Samuel Burkhardt as post commander at Fort Sheridan July 1 when he and his command, the 40th infantry regiment, were transferred to Camp Custer.

Col. Chapman will not remain as post commander at Fort Sheridan. He is to be transferred to a command at an active training camp and will probably be on his way to France with a fighting unit in a short time.

**STATE TO URGE ROAD
IMPROVEMENT AT ZION**

Sheridan Road Through Zion City Is Only Bad Stretch of Road To the North.

A conference has been called for the first part of next week by Chas. Russell, superintendent of highways, in Lake county, at which state road officials will meet city officials of Zion City, in an effort to induce the officials there to start an improvement for the paving of Sheridan Road through Zion. The stretch of one and one-half miles through the City of Zion soon will be the only unpaved stretch on the North Shore, as the paving of the six-mile stretch through Waukegan and the state line, excepting only that portion of Zion City, is well under way and will be completed by the first of the year, at least that is the hope of Mr. Russell who says that he will endeavor to see that there will be no necessity for closing Sheridan Road next year unless it is to pave through Zion City. Efforts will be made to show Zion officials some satisfactory way of putting in the improvement.

"Work on the paving of Sheridan Road is progressing in fine shape," Mr. Russell said recently, "and if Kenosha county does not hurry we will have put in our stretch of six miles before Kenosha puts in her stretch of one and one-half miles."
